FROM THE PRESIDENT

SCA held our AGM on the 27th February in Adelaide, all states had representation which was very pleasing. The AGM was delayed due to the ongoing Covid border closures and travel restrictions, going forward we will look to holding these meeting by electronic format. Continuing below is a brief summary of some of the main agenda items.

At the AGM a new Treasurer was elected - Enzo Crocitti. Enzo brings a wealth of business and financial management experience to the role, I look forward to working with him in the future. You will find further in the magazine the Audited financials for SCA for the year 2019-2020. The association made a profit in a year of significantly reduced income, this was offset by reduced expenditure due to no international team travel but never the less a very pleasing result as we had incurred losses over the previous few years.

SCA no longer have a hunting and habitat director, this area is now the sole responsibility of each state. National and International clay target shoots for the coming years have been given to various state associations who have applied, we await the final locations and timelines for these events out to 2023, this will be communicated when available over the coming months. From January 2022 all shoot handicaps will be stored and calculated online in the live scores program, clubs will not be using handicap books. Any club that cannot upload or use the program need to get in contact with your state for training, from 2022 any event that requires uploading by SCA will incur a cost of \$50.00 per event + \$1.00 per shooter this is payable by the club.

After a layoff of 388 days we finally had a national event, the 2021 FITASC Grand Prix, the full details of the event are within the article later in this edition of the magazine. I would like to thank the hosting club Rocky Gully Sporting Clays on behalf of all SCA members, the club members and President Wendel Litchfield took on the challenge of running this event even if we could not get a full field due to covid restrictions. Thankfully this did not happen we had 177 shooters compete over the weekend, the event was well run the club had workers out on the courses keeping traps full, the canteen kept everyone well fed with some great food.

This is the 100th year of FITASC with the 2021 World Championships in Hungary to be the 100th anniversary. Unfortunately FITASC has lost one of its great ambassadors and General Secretary/Treasurer (since 2014) Laszlo Szebenyi after a lengthy illness earlier this month. Laszlo always had a great interest in Australia and was a good friend to FITASC Vice President Ray McFarlane over many years. We hope the 2021 world championships can be dedicated to his name. Sporting Clays Australia has sent its condolences on behalf of all our members to FITASC and Laszlo Family.

Independent Auditor's Report to the Members

Report on the Audit of the Financial Report

Opinion

We have audited the financial report of Sporting Clays Australia Assoc Incorporated (the association), which comprises the Statement by Members of the Committee, the Income and Expenditure Statement, Balance Sheet as at 30 June 2020, a summary of significant accounting policies and the certification by members of the committee on the annual statements giving a true and fair view of the financial position and performance of the association.

In our opinion, the accompanying financial report presents fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of the association as at 30 June 2020 and [of] its financial performance for the year then ended in accordance with the accounting policies described in Note 1 to the financial statements and the requirements of the Associations Incorporation Act 1981.

Basis for Opinion

We conducted our audit in accordance with Australian Auditing Standards. Our responsibilities under those standards are further described in the Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Report section of our report. We are independent of the association in accordance with the ethical requirements of the Accounting Professional and Ethical Standards Board's APES 110 Code of Ethics for Professional Accountants (the Code) that are relevant to our audit of the financial report in Australia. We have also fulfilled our ethical responsibilities in accordance with the Code.

We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our opinion.

Emphasis of Matter – Basis of Accounting

We draw attention to Note 1 to the financial report, which describes the basis of accounting. The financial report has been prepared to assist the association to meet the requirements of Associations Incorporation Act 1981. As a result, the financial report may not be suitable for another purpose. Our opinion is not modified in respect of this matter.

Responsibilities of the Committee for the Financial Report

The committee is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of the financial report in accordance with the financial reporting requirements of the Associations Incorporation Act 1981 and for such internal control as the committee determines is necessary to enable the preparation and fair presentation of a financial report that is free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

In preparing the financial report, the committee is responsible for assessing the association's ability to continue as a going concern, disclosing, as applicable, matters related to going concern and using the going concern basis of accounting unless the committee either intends to liquidate the association or to cease operations, or has no realistic alternative but to do so.

Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Report

Our objectives are to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial report as a whole is free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error, and to issue an auditor's report that includes our opinion. Reasonable assurance is a high level of assurance, but is not a guarantee that an audit conducted in accordance with the Australian Auditing Standards will always detect a material misstatement when it exists. Misstatements can arise from fraud or error and are considered material if, individually or in the aggregate, they could reasonably be expected to influence the economic decisions of users taken on the basis of this financial report.

THIS IS NOT HOW WE ROLL! CALLING FOR MORE RESPONSIBILITY.

Our Sport is without doubt one of the most active Clay Target sports out of all the disciplines. It is not uncommon to walk two kilometers per round of 25 Clays as we work our way through a competition. Multiply this by three visits & you are starting to clock up the Kilometers & heading for a major service after a few weeks of competing. Members may have noticed more & more Buggies transporting members around the shooting ranges & it is understandable for the less mobile of our members who wish to keep on pulling the trigger. SCA reviewed this many years ago & put into place a way we could help our members be more mobile around the courses with a level of Insurance that would allow them & protect them in case of an accident.

You may be wondering why SCA has to take time to pen this article, when blind Freddy can easily see the problem that some are creating for the majority. Unfortunately, some of our members are stretching the rules past the extent of crossing the line & are making their vehicle Insurance waiver cover invalid.

The use of any range vehicle, be it for setting up or transportation during events comes with a few rules that need to be recognized & followed. As the saying goes, "Rules are rules, Jacko". Although no one likes rules, in this case the rules need to be followed.

FYI - A few years ago, SCA introduced a sign off waiver form that anyone going onto an SCA range who is using a vehicle at any SCA Club in any vehicle (not just buggies), has to sign off once in an Insurance year.

This equates to ANYONE with ANY vehicle at ANY time for ANY reason. This form is not required for the Club Car Park.

The SCA Insurance year runs from February to the following February of any given year & the form needs to be resigned every year at each & any Club you use a Quad or Buggy on a shooting range. The Club also need to keep copies of these signed & dated waiver forms on record in case of a claim.


FYI - Be aware, it is going to look suspect & be questioned should a signed waiver form be dated on the day of an accident.

This protection is there for your own good for you & for the other members around you. Do not abuse anyone who corrects you when you are not in compliance. If anyone on a committee sees you doing something wrong, they have a responsibility to address you, the problem. Should the Executive not intervene & remind you of your responsibilities, they accept your practice & they are leaving the liability option open for a visit back to themselves.

Unfortunately, as the saying goes "It is all fun and games until someone loses an eye" & in this case it also runs true.

There have been instances recently that have been brought to our attention where members are not :

1. Signing off on the Vehicle waiver form to use transport on a Club range.
2. Not using a vehicle as per the manufacturer's rules & recommendations.
3. Overloading the mode of Transport with more than the allowable seats (Particular to number 2).



The main problem arising is cart users overloading their transport. It is really simple to comply, look at your user manual. In simple terms, if your vehicle has a seating capacity for two, that's it, two people only allowed in the vehicle. Not sitting on the back tray, three or four squeezed onto the seat or worse still, hanging off the back or the side steps. Sometimes all of these issues are playing out on the one vehicle at the same time as a whole squad is moved around on a mode of transport only suited for two people. This is madness & the overloading practice must stop!!!

To those of you who are breaking the regulations. Seriously people, think of the outcome(s) of your actions to your friends & to you and your family should an accident occur under your watch.

Shooting Ranges are full of pot holes, bumps & rocks. Should you roll the vehicle, or someone loses a hand/foot hold & is bounced off, think of the possible outcome? Will you be ready for the whole world of hurt that would descend upon you should an injury happen?

Why the problem? Well rules are put in place to help protect everyone's wellbeing as best we can. Every person these days has a "Duty of Care" to cater for everyone's safety. Litigation is rampant & obvious

accidents do not just happen these days. Litigation is applied when an injury happens & reviews on compensation are made to cover the injury. Injury usually comes with a personal price with time lost at work & in the worst-case scenario people have been known to lose their life. No one wants to be in this position, least of all the Club Executives who have to answer for accident outcomes.

Be advised, should you break the basic rules required you will not have Insurance cover & you personally will wear anything that comes your way. Remember you have read & signed the form accepting all safety requirements. It will be negligence on your part.

For your information (just like any work place) we all have rules to play by. Some try to fly under the radar chancing their luck that nothing will happen. Sometimes for

many years it doesn't and people get away with it. Then suddenly the roosters come home to roost and with it the realization also hits regarding the problems that are about to come your way. It is bad enough with a self-inflicted injury, but it is more so when it places another person in the line of fire, or worse!

The Club & the Association has carried out their Duty of Care to you, you have been notified of the requirements that allows you to have an easier life navigating around a shooting range sitting in the comfort of your buggy, but the Insurance link is broken when members disregard the rules required.

Responsibility is required by all members using this mobility option. For SCA to continue to provide the Insurance option to those who use buggies & quads is fast

coming to a conclusion. If members cannot apply common sense the Insurance cover will have to be removed & walking will be your only option. I'm sure those members being responsible will be keeping an eye on the rule breakers.

This may be long winded & in parts repeated, but to the "Rule breakers" you have been warned. Seriously, it's like herding cats, how hard does it have to be to get offending members to accept & understand their responsibility?

Should we receive any further reports back on this issue the only option SCA will have left will be to cancel this insurance cover & you will all have to walk, last warning.

From this point on it is entirely up to you, CHOOSE WISELY.

2021 FITASC AUSTRALIAN GRAND PRIX



We finally break the Covid bubble what a long time a year in sport is, it has been 13 months since SCA members could compete at any national or international events or travel to another state. The 2021 Australian FITASC Grand Prix was the first major event for SCA since February 2020. SCA would like to thank the host club Rocky Gully Sporting Clays for taking on the event and putting the sport first, it takes over 110 competitors for this event to break even and no one knew what the numbers would or could be in these different times.

We had 177 competitors enjoy 2 days of good targets with perfect weather and some fantastic scores with 41 possible (25) shot across the 2 days. SCA trialed the Livescores online shoot nominations program for this event with the support of the club. It worked well and we have identified some changes required to the nomination process going forward for future events this year.

The events had a platinum sponsorship from Todd Angus of Hard Core Diamond Products, their support helped make the event the success it was. We also had 3 silver sponsors and we would like to take this opportunity to thank the companies listed below on behalf of all SCA members, without their support we could not offer the prizes on offer which was in excess of \$10000.00.

If you owned a Beretta shotgun you were well served at the event as they offered a free service to Beretta owners over the weekend they serviced 35 Guns Thankyou Beretta.

Rocky Gully's targets setters designed 4 courses for the event using the 4 stand 6,6,7,6 setup, the courses had been designed to ensure no one had any issues with the sun or vision problems picking up targets using the FITASC guidelines for difficulty.

The courses were inspected by FITASC and the SCA National Target Director on Friday and approved for the event. Very little needed to be changed, the menus were mostly used as written by the club.

The courses shot in one pass on each side of the property, competitors shooting 50 targets in each outing 100 each day.

Squads were bused to the start of course 3 and picked up at the end of course 2, the total distance around the 4 courses was 3.7km some competitors found this a little difficult.

DAY 1

With the course now set, Day 1 saw a quality field produce some great shooting over four rounds of 25 targets. Open division was tied at the end of the day with Victorians Blake Nankervis and Chris Brown scoring 98/100, each with two rounds of 25. Jeremy Kent was only one shot off the pace shooting his first 50 straight finishing on 97, with Jamie Dunn only one behind him on 96.

Adam Shale, Anthony Panetta and Adam Hirschfield were all tied on 95 after the first day.

Gavin Dyson and Jack Gibbs were even on 94 and still in the hunt as the field looked towards the second day.

In **A Grade**, eight competitors impressed with scores over 90, with Dominic Branca and Jamie Baird heading up a tight field, while Aaron Brookes and Haydn Brown remained in striking distance.

A quality **Junior** field was led by Benjamin Studham and Xavier Russell, who finished the day on 90, with Thomas Bilney still in the hunt on 86. Four other juniors finished the first 100 targets with scores over 80.

In the **Lady's**, New South Welsh-woman Emalene Munro had her eye in scoring four rounds over 20 to finish with 86, while Bianca Norris and Anna Wratten were still in the contest heading into the second day, tied up on 82.

DAY 2

The scene was set for a thrilling second day of the 2021 FITASC Australian Grand Prix.

Saturday evening the courses had been adjusted, a couple of stands toughened, shoot positions moved, menus boards changed to offer a new set of 100 targets for competitors. It was going to be a battle to the end for all the shooters.

Across the field of 177 competitors there were 9 categories creating a great representation of the diversity of sporting clay shooters from around the county.

Fine weather conditions prevailed and the course provided a great challenge for competitors across the grades.

Another four rounds of 25 targets saw some movement in the leader boards as the competitors were mentally and physically challenged by the 200 targets overall.

In the **Masters**, Alec Ceccato finished on top with a score of 171, finishing strongly ahead of Maxwell Kavanagh in second place on 167 and Richard Dean in third on 163.

In Veterans it took 19 shots in the shoot off to split Ron Rhook and Edward Magee, who finished on an impressive 185 from 200 targets. Rhook took the honours in the shoot off 19/25 to Magee's 18, with Malcom Whitehead finishing in third place with 175.

Senior was won by John Leach on 185 from 200, Robert Passarin wasn't far behind on 182 and Donato Sgarbossa took third place with 179.

In **C Grade** Rocky Gully local Rod (big bird) Saligari topped the leader board on 150/200. The home ground advantage gave him 5 shots to second place, with Jamieson Stowe just pipping Glendon Dickinson 145 to 144 to take second and third respectively, 4th Danny Genovese 143, 5th Sebastian Angus 140

In **B Grade** overnight, there were eight competitors with only five shots separating them. James Awyer came from three off the pace to finish first on 165, four shots ahead of Anthony Arscott who took second on 161. Bruce Oakley maintained his third placing overnight to take the bronze on 160, 4th Craig Smith 159, 5th Torre Ceasar 159.

There was a tight tussle taking place in **A Grade**. Four shots separated eight shooters overnight and there were only 6 shots that separated the top five by the end of day 2. Aaron Brookes

shot one better than his 91 on the first round to finish on 183 and take the **top spot** on the podium. Jamie Brookes maintained his **second place** from overnight, while Dan Blackley turned around his first day of shooting, coming from fourteenth overnight to take the **bronze** on 180. With Matt Hall fourth on 179 and Haydn Brown in fifth place on 177.

A high quality **Junior** field was on show with over half of the junior entrants having an A or AA rating/handicap. After finishing his second day on 183, Xavier Russell had a nervous wait while back in the sheds as the rest of the field made their way around. In the end, he took the gold as Benjamin Studham came in on 179 for silver, Thomas Bilney impressed with 175 for the bronze medal and Nicholas Brighenti and Jordi Eland also shot well to take fourth and fifth with 170 and 169 apiece.

In the **Ladies**, a mix of youth and experience was spread across the card with 17 year old Bianca Norris at the end of day 1 in equal second place with Anna Wratten on 82, just behind Emalene Munro on 86.

Norris hit four rounds over 20 on the second day to take it up to Munro. But Munro held strong to build on her overnight lead and take the gold medal by six shots on 176. Norris took the silver on 170 and Anna Wratten bronze with 165. Katrina Hirschfield finished strong on day 2 to take fourth on 156, while Janette Densley rounded out the top five Australian Ladies on 150.

In **Open**, Blake Nankervis and Chris Brown still could not be split after the first 50 targets on Day 2, each shooting 48 and setting up what would be a gripping final round.

Experienced Australian representatives were dotted throughout the field and produced some quality sportsmanship.

Anthony Panetta finished within 10 of the leaders at the end of the day on 186. Jamie Dunn finished fifth on 189, just holding out Adam Hirschfield on 188 for sixth.

But you could hardly split the top four after the days play with Blake Nankervis and Chris Brown still tied in first place. Both shot a perfect round of 25 on their last rounds to finish in the lead on a world class score of 195. Third and fourth place were also tied, with Jeremy Kent and Adam Shale completing the day on 192.

Under FITASC international competition rules, the Shoot off is held over four stands with six or seven targets on each stand. At the end of the 25 targets if a winner is not determined, competitors will enter a sudden death round with the first shooter to miss being eliminated.

So here we have Chris Brown and Blake Nankervis **shooting off for first and second place**, while Jeremy Kent will take on Adam Shale to determine third and fourth place overall.

As the crowd gathered in anticipation, the Officials took their place in readiness for the final stage of the two day competition.

All competitors started strongly and good seeing conditions maintained as all four shooters made a clean sweep of the first stand.

There was no letting off on the second stand, another perfect score for all four and the tension was building in the big crowd that were being treated to a fine exhibition of sporting shooting.

In the **battle for top spot**, Brown hit another clean round on the third stand. But Nankervis missed the third target to give his friendly rival a one shot lead heading into the last stand. Jeremy Kent kept his record in tact as well on the third stand and took a one shot lead, only after Shale missed the last target of the stand 3.

In the Shoot off for third place, the margin remained at one shot after the final stand was shot, with Shale hitting all six and Jeremy Kent holding his nerve to produce a perfect round of 25 to take the Bronze medal.

Looking to emulate Kent's perfect round in the Shoot off, Brown

faulted on the first shot of the last stand to let Nankervis back into it and he was equal to the challenge, nailing all six on the last stand to take the Shoot off for first place into a sudden death.

While the officials adjusted the targets and the stand position to counter the falling sun, the crowd were wondering how long they might be here for as the two Geelong greats prepared for what will be the final round.

Nankervis won the toss and elected to shoot first but missed the first target leaving **Brown with the opportunity to take the crown.**

And take it he did as the crowd applauded in recognition of the great contest that they had witnessed.



- Day 4 concludes with the Side by Side consisting 75tgs, including the Springing Teal challenge and the Tri-gun Challenge


This year's event saw record numbers of shooters in each of the disciplines with over 50 shooters vying for the title of Tri-Gun Champion.

VSCA 25TH ANNIVERSARY

Due to the resignation of Victorian Field and Game Ass. from the Field and Game Federation of Australia in 1995/96, Victorian Members who had international ambitions were left without a state body with international affiliations. To correct this situation a small group of dedicated members got together and in July 1996 Geelong Sporting Clays Ass was born.

GSCA then together with Daylesford Field and Game formed Victorian Sporting Clays Ass.

VSCA was then accepted as the Victorian affiliate to FGFA.

The next problem was where were we going to shoot, Geelong Field and Game made it clear that they were not willing to share the existing shooting range on the property of Fred and Joyce Leach.

This dilemma was quickly solved when Fred came to me and said don't worry Ray you can use another piece of my farm over the road, it will be rent free and it is more suited to Sporting Clays.

So with that offer we went to the Golden Plains Shire and received a permit to operate a Shooting range on the site. This together with approval from Vic Police saw us on the way.

So the popular and successful Silverwood Range came into being and our first event was held in July 1996.

Now the race was on, FGFA of Australia gave us the nod to conduct the 1996 Nationals under canvas.

Working bees were established and our merry group got to work, we made hand traps, constructed A frame trap houses, all this was done down at Rod Vallences farm each weekend and some evenings.

Max Kavanagh came to our assistance and purchased for us a portable classroom which he moved onto the site (thanks Max). Another stalwart was Bob Vittori who provided free of charge a large generator so as we could have power.

All our work came together and in the short space of 5 Months a successful National Carnival was held.

The main people behind all this were, Colin MacPherson, Rod Vallence, Eric Stoneman, Craig Hobbs, Keith Cruickshank, Russell Pigdon, Max Hewitt, the Kiwi Brian Lonsdale and myself etc.

We were supported by our fantastic wives who either worked in the canteen or as with Lorraine run the office, thanks for your support to Kay, June, Jean, Anita, Sheryl, Angela, Denise, Maureen and the office lady Lorraine.

Since that fateful day the club has conducted many State, National and International events and has enjoyed great patronage from its members.

Alas with the passing of Fred and Joyce and the new owner wishing to sell the property we were again needing to secure a new site, fortunately we discovered that Eric and Jocelyn Bullmore had a property of 750 acres that had a permit for Shotgun Ranges. We were able to come to a financial agreement and signed a 20 year lease.

As there are now four clubs using the site a Consortium has been formed and last year a new 20 year lease was signed.

Many improvements have been made with a renovated clubroom, large storage sheds, a 100' and 90' mobile boom towers, 80 clay target machines, three permanent Compak Sporting layouts.

When the club was first established, it was a decision of the members, that we would provide high level competition to improve the ability of our members and to provide a level of target setting

that was compatible with international standards. We continue this endeavour to this day and into the future.

GSCA members have provided over the years the bulk of Australian Team Members to the FITASC World Sporting Championships, some of these are, Younger, Brown's Chris and Bob, Nankervis's Wayne and Blake, Gibbs, Libbis, Kivinen, Hall's Robert and Peter, Pilipasidis, Leach, Vittori, MacPherson's Colin, Sheryl and Craig, Hobbs, Hewitt, Birgan, Lonsdale, Johnson, Panetta, Kavanagh, McFarlane, Blair, Barber, Van Den Berg and the list goes on. I am sure that in the haste of beating the Magazine deadline I will have missed some names and for this accept my apologies.

The trophy cabinet at Geelong provides precious memories of the success SCA has had in international FITASC competition.

GSCA always has a huge presence at any of the major international and national events conducted by FITASC and SCA.

GSCA each year also conducts the very popular National Ladies and Junior Training Camp, it is an invite only event with each State being able to send their best ladies and juniors to be coached by our leading sporting clays competitors. It is funded as an initiative by SCA to improve skill levels in these categories.



Jeremy Kent has won the 2020 Sporting Clay Champion of Champions shoot off at the recent Christmas shoot at Burrungule Park.


Kent along with Gavin Dyson & Ken Atkin qualified for the end of year shoot off having won a monthly Gambier shooting Supplies High Gun over the year.






