

The big one the Nationals is as you are now aware to be held between Laang and Timboon clubs from the 21st to the 24th of November. Because running this event over the 4 days we have the ability to include many more shooters in the event, so no SCA member should miss out if they want to nominate for the event.

The board have agreed that SCA will absorb the Nominations of all Sub Junior SCA members who wish to Nominate for the event.

The Constitution reform committee have with the approval of the board, engaged a company to assist us in rewriting the Associations Constitution and we will have a draft out soon to allow input from the wider membership.

SCA Insurance Update – 7th July 2024

Un-Registered Range Vehicle Use

The SCA Unregistered Vehicle use for our Shooting Ranges has been updated as from 7th July 2024 and were sent out to all State Secretaries with a new sign off form to all members who use Buggies & other Unregistered range Vehicles to get around the Shooting Stands. As a brief history the Unregistered Vehicle use was originally only for range set up vehicles which were usually unregistered & did not go out of the shooting range on to the National Road system where all Vehicles must be registered for use. Gone are the days where members used to walk around the Shooting Grounds, now days we have an ever-expanding range use by the membership to use their own mode of Transport to move around the Shooting Stands. This Insurance cover is only for "Un-Registered" vehicles. If members are using their own Road registered vehicles on the ranges this Insurance will not cover you, you will have to provide your own for this purpose.

The main take out of the Insurance review is this. If any Vehicle is fitted with Seat Belts as part of the Vehicle Approval/Engineering compliance for Australian use, **these seat belts must be worn**. You cannot get away with removing these seat belts as they have been fitted as part of their compliance for use. Most Golf Buggies are not fitted or have any engineering compliance certificates for their use. These vehicles do not require seat belts to be worn.

The easiest way for this is to read your user manual supplied with the Vehicle. If they mention any form of safety gear to use, you must apply their advice & use it. Failure to do this could leave you without Insurance cover in case of an accident. **If SCA members do not like the SCA Vehicle Insurance conditions they are free to take out their own Insurance Cover.**

This Insurance cover is only for SCA Members. If we have Visitors coming to shoot your Competitions they are not covered under our insurance. **This Insurance is only available to SCA MEMBERS. Visitors if they use their vehicles must provide their own Insurance & Clubs must ensure compliance.**

After all, where is the membership benefit. You pay for this service in your capitation. If your visitors complain about this condition, please remind them they are a visitor, membership covers this benefit. If Visitors do not like this, they have 4 options- 1) Become a member. - 2) Walk – 3) Provide their own Insurance. - 4) Do not attend the event.

Make Sure you sign off on the Unregistered Vehicle form at your Club before you go out onto the Range

SCA Directors Liability Insurance Addition (State & Club)

Another benefit of being a member Body & Club of SCA is this additional cover. All SCA State & Club Board/ Committees are now covered under the SCA Directors Insurance. This Insurance cover is for the wellbeing of our volunteers who take on roles in our various positions in the Association & through no fault of their own find themselves being threatened with a legal action. No one who takes on a role in our Association should have to fund something like this themselves & find themselves out of pocket due to this type of action. This cover does not hold for Committees to take out legal action, it is only for defence purposes,


A return to the USA for the 2024 FITASC World Sporting Championships to a new ground - Game Unlimited - Hudson - Wisconsin - USA. The last event in the USA was in November 2020 but unfortunately due to the Covid years no one from Australia could attend due to the lockdowns.

The Club was set on 1000 acres & as usual for the USA the FITASC World Championships were just a part of the other events in play. Everything on offer from various courses of Super Sporting, English Sporting & Compak were being run at the same time. Competitors were able to select afternoon or morning sessions to roll from one event to another.

Top that off with referees at each station (for all events in play) along with the traps & release gear required, you get a feel for the logistics to organise & run the events in the USA. A major task & credit the Game Unlimited team it flowed seamlessly. That is the bonus of running the sport as a business, rather than as volunteers.

The opening Ceremony for the event was held at the Community Park by the Hudson River in Hudson. This year it was not the usual hot & humid affair as previous Championships & it was made more of a social affair as the canapes were made available from 4:30pm when people were assembling rather than after the opening ceremony in previous years.

The opening ceremony was also one of the quickest & we were on our way back to our hotels by 7:00pm after collecting our start times & Bib numbers. This was a great initiative as it was not the usual scrum to get away.




SCA 2024 National Team Flag Bearer – Charlie Hudson.

Take away from the Event – How did it compare to last year in Hungary?

Each Shooting ground had it's differences between them. Some under your feet over tree lines. The grounds were set by Jamie Peckham from the UK & the result was a great set of targets. Jamie used the grounds to the best of his ability. Each ground had its "Out there" target (Some had a couple of those) and the most distance target would have to be the Yellow "A" target on peg 3 of Krieghoff.

I only observed one of these "A" targets hit out of 4 squads that went through. They had a fair number of these hard targets in the Doubles as well, which was a drift away from the FITASC recommendations. Still this event was kinder than the grounds in Hungary & the day-by-day Team scores reflect this with the tallies up as the below final day Team scores from Hungary show.

No SCA Team or Individual medals from the main 2024 FITASC event, Australia did have success in the final of the Beretta World Cup. The totals that make this event up for Australia are – Grand Prix – Oceania – World Championships. This is the same for the rest of the World Although for Europe they would use the European Championships in place of the Oceania event for our region.

The FITASC World Titles in Hudson USA was one of the better events conducted. Traps all ran to time along with shooting stations & rotations. No hold ups, if anything they generally ran ahead of time. Plenty of variation with distance, close, speed angle & the 3D element of swirls & curls.

Someone mentioned the low scores by attending members was down to us not Shooting harder targets? Everyone knows the hard target is the one you miss.

Shooting harder targets is a broad approach & from my observations we have tended to drift away from technical targets (3D) to hard and fast with flat angles (2D, no swirls & curls).

The final Statistics below show the percentages & how many straights recorded from each Parcours.

As usual when we go overseas, we repeat back home what we receive at the world Championships that year. Is that the best way? We are always replicating what we have received but come the next year the goal posts have moved again. In other words, we are in theory a year behind with the rest of the World. What is the answer? Maybe a good mixture of targets rather than the "Harder" option.

With that option considered to be at distance with speed. Ask anyone who shot the event. It was not the distance targets that caused the problem. Maybe its Time to relearn & start leading our own way again instead of following a year behind.

Looking forward, the 2025 FITASC World Title Event next year will be in Cyprus at Kornos Village - 24th July 2025 to 27th July 2025. The FITASC World Titles have been in Cyprus before, back in 2008.



The 2024 FITASC Oceania championships were held at Mudgee, NSW on the ANZAC long weekend at the end of April. The Mudgee team pulled out all of the stops to put on an excellent 3 day event. It was evident from the outset the club had put in a huge amount of effort to make the weekend a success. We have had some great shoots with fantastic attendances through the wet & cold months.


We are continuing to update our traps and facilities for our members and visitors. We now have a dedicated Compak layout and try shooting area.



Other big news happening in WA is the State Labor Government changing the legislation on the Firearms laws making them the toughest in Australia will come into effect February 2025. Sadly, there has been little consultation, and this labor government has a mandate to rule and has rushed legislation through. A huge thank you must be extended to those members working hard behind the scenes to get the government to listen and understand the needs of the licenced responsible law-abiding firearms owners in WA.

Range Approvals – SCWA is very fortunate to have Ian Callan as our State Firearms officer and also a range assessor who has worked tirelessly helping any clubs that needs guidance through these regulations. We have also been assisting some clubs who are affiliated with the ACTA, as we are a very small community in WA and helping our fellow clubs is important for the survival of our sport regardless of if SCA, ACTA or SSAA.

The WA Police are auditing every gun range in WA and every club must be compliant and this includes the multi affiliated clubs with SCA, ACTA and SSAA. The Police are working in with clubs to assist them to get the required documentations. Currently our only club that has been temporarily closed is the privately owned club of Three Springs, who is multi affiliated with ACTA, SSAA and SCA.



Three Springs club was looking forward to a come back into the shooting calendar since covid and hold the State Compank Championships but sadly, will not be complaint in time, so the event is now moved to the Moora Club 18th August.

2024 changes to State Qualifiers – Our club Delegates voted to trial everyone to shoot in grades at our State Qualifiers only. Except for sub juniors and juniors, they could choose. This will be reviewed and feedback from members will be encouraged. This meant that only prizes for High Gun, all grades and sub juniors and juniors were awarded. The other change that the Club Delegates voted on was to allow the host club to decide what the nomination fee for a Target only shooter would be. Also, our Board decided to give Sub Juniors and Juniors free nominations for the State Qualifiers and reimburse the clubs for the targets.

Both the Laang and Timboon Clubs are busy preparing for the 2024 Nationals in Sporting. It is the first time that the event is being held over two different clubs and provides the possibility of more variation than ever seen in target presentation, the ability to provide for all who wish to attend.

It promises to be a fantastic event and one you should not miss.

The Victorian Championships are being conducted by Daylesford Branch and will be held at the Clunes range. Clunes provides great terrain and allows for very varied target presentation. The event is fully prescribed with a waiting list. This also promises to be a great event.

Membership is steady at 500 members and we have welcomed new clubs into or midst with more interest from other potential member clubs.

The 2024 Compak Sporting series is growing from strength to strength with a major sponsor expressing interest in further promoting the discipline into the future.

VSCA members performed quiet well at the recent World Championships at Game Unlimited in Hudson. The trio of Robert Hall 181/200, Cameron Kivinen and Xavier Russell both 180/200 were the top performers for Australia all needing to add only one target per round against the fantastic winning score of 189/200 by Zack Kienbaum. To show the depth of competition Robert was 32nd overall and Cam and Xavier finished tied in 36th place. John Younger 172/200 finished in 14th place in the Seniors, Charlie Hudson 156/200 16th place in Ladies and Ben Studman 173/200 Junior finished in 9th place in the Juniors.



To show how the rest of the world have taken a step forward is illustrated by the three American ladies who tied on 182/200 and had to shoot off for gold, silver and bronze. Their score was superior to any of our Australian members and the targets in the shoot off were tougher than any I have seen before but Karen miles was able to score 20/25 to take out the title. This showed what a accomplished performer she was as Matarese and Digweed in the same shoot off both scored 21/25.

Jamie Peckham the FITASC range designer provided a great range of targets that were all very visible and provided a tough test for all competitors.

What do we do to retain our place in World Sporting Clays, my opinion is that we need to get back to setting our ranges with more variety in target trajectories and increasing the difficulty in some of the C category targets that are thrown at club events.

Compared to the rest of the world we are amateurs competing against professionals, many of the American shooters are shooting in excess of 50 to 60 thousand shotshells per year, this we cannot match in Australia due to density of population and the opportunity to shoot seven days per week as they do. I am still proud of our achievements and consider that we are the best amateurs in the world

Great to see Ron Rhook Gold Medallist in the Veteran World Cup, John Younger Silver in the Seniors and Robert Passarin Bronze in the Veterans.
