



47th World Sporting Championship 24 – 27 July 2025 / Kornos – Cyprus



Under the searing Mediterranean sun, Australia's sporting clays team delivered a performance brimming with heart at the 2025 FITASC World Championships in Cyprus. From strategic camaraderie to nail-biting finishes, the squad's unity and resilience shone through every challenge—proving once again that Australian grit travels well.

A Team United

The campaign began quiet moments of connection—shared coffees, strategy huddles, and the steady reassurance of familiar banter. On Wednesday morning, the team gathered for a breakfast, blending laughter and focus. Plates of eggs and toast became makeshift planning tables as veterans shared wisdom with juniors. When the squad marched into the opening ceremony, their sharp formal uniforms weren't just a symbol of national pride but a testament to their collective resolve. "We're here to leave nothing in the barrel," remarked one shooter, setting the tone for the days ahead.

Ranges That Tested Mettle

The eight competition grounds, each a 15-minute bus ride from the event hub, became arenas of ingenuity. Targets ranged from heart-racing 15m incomers to distant 75m edge on birds that demanded laser-like precision. Wind shifts and heat haze added layers of complexity, forcing shooters to recalibrate instincts with every station. "You'd think a 75m target gives you time to breathe," said one competitor. The targets were of world class standard, very cleverly set by course setter Jamie Packham using the terrain to present birds that required thought. The varied setups kept scores unpredictable, with final standings hanging in the balance until the very last clay of the tournament. Even seasoned athletes admitted the course design was a masterclass in mental endurance.

Results That Defined the Fight

When the dust settled, Australia's tenacity rang through the rankings:

Robert Passarin: Silver, Veterans Individual

Renae Birgan: Bronze, Ladies Individual

Veterans Team Silver: Robert Passarin, Ernie Scheidl, Russell Pigdon

Beretta Cup Silver: Bianca Norris (Ladies), Nate Palubiski (Juniors), Robert Passarin (Veterans)

The medal haul reflected depth across categories, but the narrow margins—some decided by a single target—highlighted the intensity of the field.

To Portugal With Purpose

As the team packed their kits, eyes already turned to 2026. "Cyprus taught us how to adapt,". "Portugal? That's where we perfect it." With a mix of seasoned campaigners and rising stars, the squad returns home sharper—and hungrier. The 2026 World Championships loom as both a challenge and an opportunity to build on this year's hard-won lessons.

A Nation's Pride

To every Australian who stayed up late tracking scores, sent messages of support, or simply cheered from afar: you were part of our team. The squad carried your belief like a talisman, especially during the toughest stations.

Unsung Heroes: The Heartbeat of the Campaign

Finally, to the families, partners, and friends who stood in the trenches: you braved the same scorching heat, hauling gear, managing logistics, and offering silent strength when the pressure peaked. You tracked every score with bated breath, celebrated small victories, and softened the sting of near-misses. Behind every medal, every target smashed, was your unwavering support. This journey wasn't just ours—it was yours, too.

The journey continues in 2026. Watch this space and keep your eyes on Portugal.





2025 UNIVERSAL TRENCH WORLD CHAMPIONSHIPS

The 43rd World Championships for Universal Trench were held in the Eternal City, Rome, Italy, at Tiro a Volo Roma, located approximately 30 minutes' drive from the heart of Rome.

The range features eight layouts, all equipped with FAB Trap machines, and is owned and operated by Olympic Silver Medallist in Double Trap, Francesco D'Aniello. A record 25 Australians entered the event—15 official team members and 10 individual shooters—which was fantastic to see.

Universal Trench Australia once again assisted all shooters with permits and paperwork. All but one competitor had smooth, hassle-free travel. Unfortunately, John Maxwell experienced airline clearance issues and had to leave his trusty Perazzi at home, opting instead to borrow a firearm in Italy.

Many competitors travelled earlier than usual to take advantage of the wide range of competitions offered in Italy—the home of clay target shooting. Our athletes put in some excellent performances at these events. Others planned to shoot a warm-up event in Rome that was unfortunately cancelled by FITASC at the last minute, though they were still able to train on the layouts.

By Monday, the full team had arrived in Rome and settled into their accommodation, with most staying at Hotel Tivoli, a comfortable hotel 15–20 minutes from the shooting range. A team bus was also organised to transport shooters to and from the venue.

We quickly discovered that range expenses were steep. Ammunition prices had jumped to €135 per slab of 250, compared with the €80–85 we had seen elsewhere. With the exchange rate at AUD \$0.58, food and drink were also costly—for example, a standard bottle of soft drink cost €4 (about AUD \$7). Strict firearm laws also applied: all guns had to be covered when not in use, making “gun slip” covers a necessity.

Additionally, spectators were not permitted behind the layouts, even if they were part of the next squad. We were told this was due to a tragic incident at another nearby shooting range, which led authorities to impose these rules.

All shooters managed to get in the practice rounds they needed and were feeling confident. On Tuesday night, we held our team dinner at the Grand Hotel Duca d'Este, right next door to our hotel. It was a wonderful evening with excellent food and camaraderie. During the dinner, Craig Bentley was proudly announced as our team flag bearer for the opening ceremony.

The Opening Ceremony was spectacular, featuring Roman warriors and an incredible air show filled with smoke and colour. Everyone thoroughly enjoyed the evening and returned eager for competition.

Competition Days

The weather during competition was warm, in the low to mid-30s, with afternoon breezes each day. After the first 100 targets, several of our shooters were in strong contention across categories, and our teams were looking solid. Nathan Argiro had put himself in a great position in the Open category, Cameron Ford looked strong in Juniors, and Catherine Skinner was well placed in the Ladies.

Heading into the final round:

- Nathan needed a perfect 25 to make the Open shoot-off.
- Cam needed a 25 to make the Junior shoot-off.
- Catherine also needed a 25 to reach the Ladies shoot-off.
- Domingo Diaz posted a strong 25 in his first round of the last day, putting him in medal contention in the Masters category.

Unfortunately, strong winds swept across layouts 1 and 2 as a nearby storm passed, making conditions very challenging. As luck would have it, Nathan, Catherine, and Cameron all had to shoot on these layouts.

- Nathan finished with a 23, placing equal 4th in Open.
- Catherine scored a 21, finishing equal 5th in Ladies.
- Cameron, however, rose to the occasion, shooting a flawless 25 to set a new PB of 193, sending him to a shoot-off for Gold!
- Domingo finished with a 22, securing 4th in the Masters.
- Fletcher Richardson had a brilliant final day, scoring 49/50, which lifted him to 4th in Juniors with 186.

The atmosphere was electric heading into Cameron's shoot-off against Spanish Junior Héctor Ávila Manjón. A large group of Aussies gathered to cheer him on, and Nathan, thinking quickly, even fetched a chair to keep Cam shaded during a short delay.

The shoot-off began with a full round of 25 targets. Both juniors shot clean rounds! They moved to sudden-death single barrel. Cam, shooting first, narrowly missed a high left target, while Manjón hit his straight-away to claim gold. Cam took a well-deserved silver medal—a fantastic achievement!

The best of the Broken Hill shooters were Brett Howe, Brian Casey and Lincoln Casey who all finished in first place in their respective categories, while Kym Files, Bob Tweedie, Anthony Elliott and Saxon Locke all picked up placings.

It was no good complaining to the Shooting Associations for no standing up for the sport as there was no ammunition in our cupboard to use in a discussion with the Qld Government to keep the sport going. We would encourage anyone to join QSCA (or any shooting body if they do not shoot Sporting Clays) & keep firearm ownership where it should be. We can talk from a position of strength if we have the numbers.

A JOURNEY ACROSS THE GLOBE: MY SPORTING CLAYS EXPERIENCE JACK DAVIS

My journey overseas was full of unforgettable learning experiences, challenging moments, and new friendships that I will carry with me for a lifetime.

Leading up to my departure, I was a mix of excitement and nerves. The thought of traveling across the globe to compete in the two most prestigious sporting clays competitions — including one hosted in the very birthplace of sporting clays — was surreal. It was the kind of opportunity you dream about as a young shooter.

Competing at the English Sporting World Championships at E.J. Churchill's (Buckinghamshire) and the FITASC World Championships at Kornos in Cyprus was a true eye-opener. The difficulty and technicality of the international targets pushed me far beyond my comfort zone. These were not the targets I was used to back home — they were faster, further, and more unpredictable. Each course demanded a new level of focus and adaptability.

But it was not just the shooting that made this trip unforgettable.

The range of competition was incredible, with shooters from every corner of the world. And beyond the range, the thrill of exploring new countries, cultures, and cuisines made the experience even richer.

Adventuring through the English countryside shooting at grounds such as Bisley, Westfield, Bedfordshire (the High Tower Challenge definitely challenging!) and along the Mediterranean coast with my family created memories we'll never forget. Thanks to my dad Dan and to Missy for making this possible.

One of the absolute highlights was the chance to shoot at the prestigious Holland & Holland Shooting Grounds in England. Known worldwide for its history and excellence, stepping onto those immaculate grounds was like entering a piece of sporting clays royalty. The professionalism, the attention to detail, and the atmosphere made it an experience I'll never forget. It was an honour just to be there — and it gave me a glimpse into the heritage and tradition that the sport has overseas, and I will be forever grateful to Jason Pollock for organising this incredible



experience, and for Bruce the Pom getting the professional shooting instructors with us to do a "flush shoot" of clays! Great fun.

Another unforgettable moment was spending my 16th birthday at Miller & Co Steakhouse Beaconsfield. Michael and Simone Lucas, whose generosity and support enabled this journey possible. It was a special night — good food, great company, and a moment to reflect on how far I had come, even at such a young age. Sharing that evening with people who believe so deeply in supporting juniors like myself meant the world to me.

From England we headed to Cyprus for the FITASC World Championships (Don't ask Dad or Missy about LOT Polish Airlines... Not Happy Dan!) and the contrast was immediate.

The moment I stepped off the plane, it felt like I had walked straight into a sauna. The average temperature was 43°C (109°F) — dry, intense, and relentless. It was a whole new kind of challenge, one that tested not only my shooting ability but my endurance, hydration, and mental focus. Every day felt like a battle against the heat as much as the targets.




Despite the heat, Cyprus was an incredible experience in every way. When we were not on the range, we spent time traveling along the beautiful Mediterranean coastline soaking in the sun, the scenery, and the local culture. I also had the chance to try some of the local seafood cuisine, which was awesome and some of which I'd ever tasted before, and again another reminder of how travel can open your senses as much as your perspective.

To top it all off I had the chance to meet some of my idols, the shooters I had only ever seen behind a screen! Talking with legends like Ben Husthwaite, George Digweed, Brandon Powell, and Derick Mein was both humbling and inspiring. They were incredibly generous with their advice and encouragement, and those conversations left a lasting impact.

I am truly grateful to FSB Ammunition, The Lucas Bursary, my dad, Dan, Missy & Ben Husthwaite for making this trip possible — not just for me, but for many other juniors chasing their dreams in the sport.

Their support gave me a chance to explore the world and its diversity through the lens of international competition.

This journey was more than just a shooting trip it was a life-changing experience that opened my eyes to what is possible in this sport, and how far passion and dedication can take you.


