

The scores were good and the Crew at Rocky Gully put on a great shoot with some grounds that were challenging but there were some targets for all grades. The Australian team was selected to go to the FITASC World Championships.

Our Australian team went to the Fitasc Oceania's held at Rotorua in New Zealand. At this event the Australians dominated the podium, so it was a great result.

The Australian team that represented us in Cyprus did the country proud despite the heat and smoke haze that was a feature of the event. Many podium positions were held by the Aussies, and they looked very professional in the updated team uniform. Podium have been published in the last magazine.

The board had the opportunity to try something different this year so we ran the English Sporting Nationals a couple of days before the Sporting Nationals at the Gold Coast Gun Club. This proved a winner with over 180 shooters competing. I believe this is a record for our sport and everyone I spoke to would like to see it continue next year. Gold Coast did an amazing job with target selection and the layout of grounds a huge thank you to all involved.

The pinnacle of the year was the Sporting Nationals held in Brisbane. Once again Brisbane showed why they are the Premier club in the organisation the attention to detail was perfect as usual, thanks to all involved. The SCA 2025 English Sporting Nationals was the first leg of a week of Shooting in Queensland. Combining two National events was a first for SCA. Members have been requesting for several years to string together a week of shooting for our members to make the most of their travelling time. Many commented how positive this move was & a well-received addition to the National series.

Anyway, the planets aligned in 2025 in Queensland with the opportunity & position of the Gold Coast Clay Target Club & Brisbane Sporting Clays (which were close enough together) in South East Queensland to make this happen. You could not fault the weather for this event which was just perfect.

The GCCTC joined QSCA back in 2021 & this was their first venture into a National Competition for SCA. Many would not realise the hard work that went on prior to the event by the Club in preparing the grounds & making it suitable to hold the event. Four separate courses had been set so competitors had plenty of targets on offer.

On 11 and 12 October the Broken Hill Field and Game Association hosted its premier simulated field clay target shoot for the year, the 40th annual 150 target Silver City Championships. The weather was warm and breezy on Saturday, and cool and wet on Sunday, but not too bad for shooting clay targets. Organisers were delighted with the attendance of 76 shooters.

The shooters competed for an excellent range of sashes and trophies thanks to the generosity of our sponsors; Ricky Jones of Buckalow Station, Boltons Precision Engineering, Flat Out Tyres, Outdoor Trading Company, the Claypan Penguins, and Hayden Beven.

Range marshal Josh Edgecumbe, with plenty of assistance, worked very hard to set a range layout that provided plenty of interest and variety. The targets were a bit more challenging than average which made for very good shooting.

The best overall score for the shoot was an excellent total of 127 recorded by AA Grade shooter Aidan Salmeron representing the Riverland Club. This was Aidan's first visit to the Silver City Championships and he won the Silver City Shield High Gun trophy and sash with just a single shot up his sleeve at the finish.

PRESIDENTS REPORT TO THE 2025 AGM

PRESIDENT'S REPORT TO THE 2025 AGM

Twelve months ago my first President's report, to the AGM in November 2024, indicated that the current SAFGA constitution was not fit for purpose. Moments later that prophetic statement was proved correct with no Board being elected by the delegates present! The Department of Consumer & Business Services directed the Association to hold a special meeting in January of this year, and fortunately a Board was then elected to run the Association for the benefit of its 460 members. Upon re-election our stated aims were to finalise the 2025 competition calendar, update the competition rules, bring the Ragless issues to a conclusion, and start work on a new constitution for the State.

I am pleased to report that this hard working Board has almost completed these stated aims, and probably would have succeeded completely had we not lost two months of the year due to being paralysed for two months with no Board.

Our TSSD Joe Densley has run a successful year of competition including state qualifiers, and culminating with the state titles being held at the Centrals club. Whilst numbers were lower than previously we thank the host club for their contribution. Now that our own competition rules have been updated and approved it is essential that the SCA national body gives conclusive direction around the current uncertainty of clubs wishing to shoot Compak/5 stand.

As you will see in the Treasurer's report, the Ragless issues are almost in the rear view mirror.

Our Legislation Officer John Kentish has done outstanding work in deciphering the issues for a more thorough understanding by all members. Whilst there are no winners, the Board hopes that all parties can move forward as the cloud of uncertainty has been lifted and equity issues have been tackled.

The Board was roundly criticised last year for a loss of \$155 in the annual accounts. That has been turned around this year through diligent fiscal management, and we have recorded a profit of \$7,673, which has been confirmed by our auditor. The Board decided to move from the ANZ bank to the Bendigo bank, partly because the financial reserves of the Association could enjoy the better interest available in a Bendigo Term Deposit.

Following the conclusion of the financial year and the preparation of our books for audit, John Kentish resigned his position as Treasurer. The Board was then able to use the casual vacancy created by John's resignation to engage in succession planning by appointing Delilah Rybak to the Treasurer's portfolio. I thank Delilah for offering her services to the Association, and note that succession planning and renewal are critical to the long term success of associations.

Our Legislation Officer John Kentish and myself have attended three meetings with club committees to discuss a draft constitution. The Board has spent a huge amount of time going through the document, literally line by line, and has done this more than once as suggestions have been made. Unfortunately the Board has been distracted by events outside of its control and this has delayed the process. Whilst we were originally hoping to present a new constitution for approval at this year's SAFGA AGM, the Board has now decided to delay until the new year in order to fully listen to members in order to get the best result. However, I am glad to report that everyone seems to be in total agreement in regards to the reintroduction of democracy, which has been sadly missing for the past five years!

I am proud to advise members that your Board has met sixteen times during the year, via online Teams meetings. This has created plenty of work for our hard working secretary Phil Papaioannou, especially when you consider the numerous newsletters he has produced and other matters he has had to attend to. Thank you Phil.

As you will have gathered, the Board has had a very busy year. The Board has proved to be a very good team, not always agreeing about everything, but always willing to work co-operatively for the overall good of SAFGA. I thank the Board.


