

SCA PRESIDENTS REPORT



Well what a great start to the year its turning out to be.

The SCA Grand Prix was a full event for the very first time. The event was run flawlessly by the dedicated and well-oiled team from Laang. I had the pleasure of shooting with the Winner Chris Brown. What an awesome display of shooting.

The SCA board had a strategic planning workshop over 2 days in Brisbane in January. I think everyone who attended the forum for the weekend found it to be invaluable. We managed to put all policies and procedures into place ready for a smooth transition for incoming board members now & into the future.

Part of this workshop was a presentation from Willy Van Vaerenbergh, an Environmental Consultant who has expertise in Environmental Management & exposure to problems at shooting ranges. The SCA Board have decided to implement Environmental guidelines which will be distributed to all States & allow a pathway to be followed that has everyone talking the same language should anything happen with State EPA agencies. This is extremely important (talking the same language). If a club is forced into making a decision due to pressure from any EPA group, it could have wider implications for the shooting community as a whole. Once precedence has been set it will be impossible to have this reversed. Having expert access available will relieve the pressure point for the Committees knowing you have access to an expert in this field.

This has SCA members being proactive rather than reactive regarding lead management and environmental issues.

Looking ahead to the 2017 Nationals in WA with a little forward planning, Phil Rendell made a quick trip over to Echidna Park near Geraldton. We, along with lan Grant, mapped out the eight grounds for the 2017 SCA Nationals. There will only be two of the grounds that have ever been shot over before. Ian has 12,000 Acres with some fantastic terrain. The club house has to be seen to be believed. The canteen will be run by a qualified chef. There will be ample camping on the grounds and only 30mins to Geraldton which has a population of 40,000 & plenty of Accommodation. Don't miss out book your seat to the Nationals early to avoid disappointment.

LAANG VIC | 4-5 MARCH 2017

15TH AUSTRALIAN GRAND PRIX

Finally, the total competitors for the 15th Australian Grand Prix who actually competed was raised to 203, this was a great result from our members showing Sporting Clays is definitely growing in popularity in Australia.



I arrived on the Friday morning and viewed the targets with Steve Chilton President of the Host Club.

After some minor adjustments to some target trajectories we were ready to go by around 1-30pm.

Shooting started spot on at 8am on the Saturday and with John MacKenzie at the computer, everything went fine for the day

The targets presented were set as a test for our top competitors but there were also targets for the shooters in the Categories and Grades to build a score.

The highlight was Daniel Baskerville from NSW and Chris Brown Vic. who led the 1st day with 96/100, Sox 95, Mortensen and Craig MacPherson 94, Cefai, Nankervis, Guerra and Birgan 93, with a number of others following closely behind.

Ladies: Was this the event when we would see Renae Birgan finally lose a major ladies event in Australia, she has had a magnificent run over many years and we have all wondered when the time would come, well Brittany Cole laid down the challenge with 82/100, Renae 80, Felicity Paglia 79 and Lyndall McNeill 76 all pushing for mission impossible.

Juniors: Bryce Paglia performed to the promise that he has shown and led with a great 93/100, Billy Cain 89, Cameron Kivinen and Luke Willemsen 88. Mitch Cain and Matthew Wilesmith both 87.

Veterans: With the Murghebuloc farmer John Leach on 91/100, Colin Johns 90, Ross Clancy 86 and Neil Peart were the main contenders in this division.

Super Veterans: Alan Backman continued his good form and was co leader with Bryan Rafferty on 81/100, Roger Kerslake 80, Ross Christian 79 were the main men in this Category.

When you see the scores you may think that the targets were a little on the easy side, I can assure you that was not the case, Laang had put on a great set of targets with variable trajectories that can be thrown using the available terrain.

While the weather on Saturday was good, it was unusual to get two such great days in the Warrnambool area. This assisted the shooters to perform at their best and it left no excuses if your performance was not up to par.

Day two targets were a little stiffer than the previous day and all looked good for some fantastic shooting.

Chris Brown continued on from the Saturday and posted a 94/100 total 190/200 to take the title from Brian Mortensen, Sox, Damien and Blake all on 186/200

Ladies: This was the end of a run greater than that of Black Caviar, I do not think that you would find a longer run without a defeat in any other sport as long as the winning run of Renae, Brittany Cole with a total of 164/200 took out the ladies from Felicity 160 and Renae 158.

Juniors: Saw a new rooster on the block Bryce Paglia who has in the past played second fiddle to Jeremy he earnt a great win with a score of 180/200 from Cameron Kivinen 177/200 and Mitchell Cain took 3rd place with 175.

Veterans: This was the Ross Clancy day, 91/100 included two possibles this made a total of three for the event. Suffering a bout of gastro Ross battled on and shot brilliantly for the day, with a total of 177/200 he tied with Colin Johns which meant a shoot-off, in third place was Neil Peart who started the day of with 49/50 and finished on 174 and John Leach 173/200.

Super Veterans: Alan Backman 162/200, Bryan Rafferty 161/200 and Roger Kerslake 157/200 got the bikkies.

We had two fantastic sponsors for the event, Bruce Burns of GB Corsivia provided all the prizes for the places in the all of the categories and Grades.

Clay and Hunt represented by Socrates Pilipasidis and Renae Birgan put a big smile on the Overall winner Chris Brown's face, when they presented the Champion's Trophy a Zoli U/O Shotgun.

This was Clay and Hunt's first appearance as a sponsor and we welcome them to continue in the years to come, Thanks Sox and Renae

Of course, what would a SCA event be without Bruce Burns contributing as he does at all of these events. A total of 104 slabs of GB ammunition was distributed amongst the various prize winners.

Many of the winners and placegetters in the Grades and Categories remarked on the quality of the trophies and in all cases had to call on support to cart the goodies away. Are all those slabs mine was a common remark.

To all our Team Members we wish you the best of good fortune in Hungry and may you all represent SCA & Australia with pride.

What was disappointing is that a small number of people who had entered either withdrew prior to the event, or just never showed up. The original cut-off of entries was 218, with 8 on the wait list. Some of the vacancies were filled by people on the wait list, but when late withdrawals came in, not all that were on the wait list had enough time to make arrangements for air travel and getting accommodation. There is also a problem for the host club who base their catering & other amenities on the registered numbers & people

who could have made up the shortfall are unable to attend at short notice.

It would be better if when you enter an event that you turn up. It is inconvenient and makes the job of keeping squads with a workable number of shooters in each squad difficult and time consuming.

Of course, for those who withdraw at least two weeks prior to the event, there is an administrative withdrawal fee of \$30, Those who withdraw less than two weeks prior to the event can lose your entire entry fee without a reasonable reason. These conditions are made clear when you nominate for the event in the standard SCA "Terms & Conditions"

Well those who did not attend missed out on one of the best events conducted by SCA.

As Vice President of FITASC it was my responsibility to control the event and see that all arrangements were to the rules and policies of FITASC. Well done Laang a fantastic production & a big thank you to all SCA members that competed.

Interview with Chris Brown

WINNER OF THE 2017 AUSTRALIAN GRAND PRIX

How did you prepare for the Grand Prix?

I prepared for the Grand Prix with specific training more focused on endurance and stamina to cope with two long days of competition, making sure my body and arms could more than endure the time shooting.

Is this your first Grand Prix win? If you've taken out a title before, when was your last one?

This was actually my fourth Grand Prix win. My previous title before this was the newlyreturned English Sporting Nationals in 2015.

What do you shoot with?

I shoot with a Zoli Z-Sport and use GB shells. I find the new Sporting Extreme shell an all-round excellent cartridge for shooting Sporting Clays in Australia.

What did you think of the targets at the comp? Were any stations more difficult than others?

I thought the target presentations at the Grand Prix were great; something there for everyone and also enough technical targets to present a great challenge. The targets are always fantastic down at Laang, the team down there do an excellent job and work really well together. That's why we try our best to get to every one of their monthly shoots.

There was obviously some tough competition at the event, especially in the Opens. Were there any particular standout performances in any other grades for you?



Tough competition is an understatement. The amount of shooters these days that are capable of winning a shoot is amazing. Gone are the days when a winner could be predicted. Some of the performances in the Juniors and Sub Juniors were also outstanding. Just goes to show that clay target shooting in Australia is in a very good place and only getting better.

At what point did you know you were going to take out the win?

Going into the very last round I knew I had a couple of targets buffer, so I felt pretty comfortable that if I put in a solid effort in that round I could cement the win.

Did you have a good time at the event?

We enjoyed ourselves very much at the shoot. We camped at the ground in our camper trailer. The Laang range has excellent facilities for campers; nothing beats being finished shooting and being able to relax straight away with a couple of quiet drinks with some great friends and not have to worry about driving anywhere afterwards.

Congratulations on being named in the SCA Australian Team for 2017 as well. Any goals you're out to achieve?

Thank you. I think an amazing team performance on the world stage is imminent. Our teams are as strong as any teams out there, considering we do the most amount of travel to get to the World Championships every year wherever they are in the world. If we continue to prepare well and deliver what we are capable of, it will be amazing.

Interview with Ian Grant

PRESIDENT OF ECHIDNA PARK SPORTING CLAYS



1. Why was Echidna Park formed?

The Club was formed under Sporting Clays Australia by a dedicated group of members to ensure we could maintain our numbers and attract new members to Echidna Park. Under the former ACTA banner, all participating shooters were required to be an ACTA member. This did not open shoots up to members of any other association and our numbers would have been significantly reduced at any event we held, so we formed the new club under SCA.

2. Why is the Club named Echidna Park?

The name came from a camp ground set up here by my Father in the nineties as Echidnas are native to the area and can still be spotted around the grounds today.

3. What kind of facilities are on the grounds?

Echidna Park is in the process of building a clubhouse with facilities including a full stainless steel kitchen, bar and meals area, hot showers, toilets and hopefully we will have some powered sites for campers and caravans (to be confirmed closer to the Nationals).

4. How many grounds will be available for the 2017 Nationals?

The Nationals will be run over eight grounds, which will be the same number as last year's event in Brisbane. Four of these grounds are Greenfield sites.

There will be two grounds available for practice on Wednesday and Thursday.



5. What kind of terrain can we expect at the 2017 Nationals?

You will see from photos the grounds offer some very unique and varying terrain, from very steep hills to more open, flatter country all set in a piece of virgin bush.

Buses will be utilised to transport shooters to and from the clubhouse to the various grounds. Ablution blocks will be available throughout the grounds.









6. Where is Echidna Park and how do I get there?

Echidna Park is located approximately 35km outside of the city.

Travel 5km on Yanget Road and follow signs to Echidna Park Sporting Clays Club. Yanget Rd is 30km east of Geraldton on the Geraldton-Mt Magnet Road.

7. Do you have any recommendations for accommodation?

Geraldton has a variety of accommodation available, from caravan parks to self-contained apartments and hotels. Geraldton has accommodation suitable for groups of all sizes.

If you book at the Mantra Geraldton, mention the SCA Nationals at Echidna Park and they will offer you a discount.

Camping and caravans are welcome on the grounds with full amenities available. Bookings are essential.

8. Tell us a little about Geraldton?

Geraldton is a city in the mid-west region of Western Australia, located approximately 400km from Perth. Qantas and Virgin both offer flights to Geraldton and it's about a one hour trip from Perth. Geraldton has many car hire companies available from the airport.

For those driving to Geraldton, there are two routes available; Brand Highway or the more

















scenic route (often used by caravans / RVs) via Indian Ocean Drive. Both routes will take between 4 to 4.5 hours of travel time.

The population of Geraldton is between 30,000 and 35,000 people. There are plenty of restaurants, cafes, fast food outlets available in the city.

Geraldton is known for its pristine beaches, beautiful wildflowers, amazing surfing and incredible seafood. Wildflower tours can be organised via the Visit Geraldton website and if you're a keen fisherman, fishing charters can be organised through Justin Pirrottina on 0429 900 071 or by contacting Greg Brown at http://bataviacharters.com.au/.

The Abrolhos Islands are situated 60km off the Geraldton coast. There are a number of shipwrecks in the vicinity of the Abrolhos Islands and the area is fantastic for snorkelling, diving, fishing and bird watching. Why not get a group of friends together for a day trip, or consider staying a few nights?

Geraldton is surrounded by many local attractions so take some time to explore the area. Visit the Kalbarri National Park, Greenough River, Geraldton History Trails or view the HMAS Sydney II Memorial. 9. What will Echidna Park have in store for the Nationals?

Echidna Park will have meals available for purchase from 7am all the way through into the evening.

Trade exhibitors will be in attendance so all ammunition and merchandise will be available for purchase on site.

Echidna Park is an environmentally friendly club; there will be water bottles for purchase which you can refill with pure rain water from the Club's rain water tanks (situated near the clubhouse). This will reduce the risk of littering disposable plastic bottles throughout the bushland.

After the presentations conclude on Sunday night, Echidna Park has organised a chefcooked seafood feast that will be available to all for purchase. Diners can expect the menu to showcase the delectable local seafood that Geraldton is famous for.

10. What if I didn't get enough shooting at the SCA Nationals?

The weekend after the SCA Nationals, Geraldton Clay Target Club will be holding their annual Crayfish Carnival with 300 targets DTL and if you are still standing, the State DTL Championships are being held in Perth the week after that.

Echidna Park is very excited to be your hosts over the Nationals and will make your stay a memorable one.

Environmental ManagementA Challenge or an Opportunity?

Environmental management at shooting ranges is becoming a topical issue that needs to be addressed by shooting clubs and organisations worldwide. Legal, regulatory and public concerns about environmental issues at outdoor shooting ranges are being raised more frequently, and this trend will likely continue. It is in the best interest of our National, State and Local entities to acknowledge the concerns about possible environmental issues at our ranges.

In January 2017, the SCA Executive Team and its environmental consultant had a workshop to discuss the potential environmental risks associated with clay shooting, the role of environmental management at shooting ranges and why it is required, and the need for environmental stewardship.

Sporting Clays Australia (SCA) has now taken the initiative to develop national *Environmental Management Guidelines for Sporting Clay Shooting Ranges* that will help SCA's member clubs in adopting and practising the principles of **Environmental Stewardship** at their facilities.

Environmental stewardship refers to responsible use and protection of the natural environment through conservation and sustainable practices. SCA's strategy reflects its commitment to protecting the environment, the wider community and the best interests of its member clubs.

Environmental Stewardship

- minimise potential impacts on human health and the environment
- protect groundwater, surface water, wetlands, wildlife, ecosystems, etc.
- protect the wider community (e.g. manage noise)
- prevent erosion, runoff, site contamination, etc.

A Best Management Plan is a recommended site management and/or maintenance activity, usually based on an approach that has been shown to work effectively for the purpose intended. A best management practice is based on use of readily available equipment and/or technology.

The guideline document will provide member clubs with a framework to develop and implement what is known as Best Management Practices (BMP) at their facilities. The Guidelines will provide Clubs with information necessary to understand Commonwealth, State and Local Government regulatory requirements and gain sufficient technical knowledge on environmental risks to implement sound environmental strategies. Ultimately, it is each member club's responsibility to put these into practice to ensure they comply with Commonwealth and State legislation as well as their local Council's by-laws and planning schemes.



The Guidelines also outline the risk management principles that underpin the development of environmental management plans at shooting ranges. These internationally and nationally accepted principles advocate a staged approach and process that allow factual assessments of risk, so that the focus can be on managing real risks rather than 'perceived' risks.

KNOWLEDGE

An important part of the Guidelines is a toolkit to help member clubs assess and understand

their environmental risks as part of the first step in the process so they can define the potential risks, select applicable and feasible BMPs, and implement Environmental Management Plans (EMPs). This toolkit is intended to make the process less daunting and more manageable for our clubs.



TOOLS



The toolkit comprises a series of checklists and questionnaires that can be completed by our Clubs. These questionnaires then feed into a more detailed assessment of the environmental settings of the shooting ranges, together with an assessment of potential impacts on human health and the environment. These assessments are very site-specific, as environmental settings differ from club to club. For example, a club near a major river or creek operates in very different environment from a club located in a desert environment in the outback. Also, the nature of sporting clay shooting poses additional challenges with spent lead shot and clay targets being spread over a larger

area compared to rifle ranges or trap/skeet ranges. The terrain is also quite different, meaning traditional clean-up methods such as scraping topsoil and lead removal are not possible. This needs to be taken into account in the risk assessment and the selection of BMPs.

• establish and accept environmental stewardship principles Club buy-in · understand environmental settings of the range • identify potential environmental and community issues Risk assess and rank potential risks assessment select Best Management Practices • implement Environmental Management Plans Risk Management monitor effectiveness of BMPs monitor environmental conditions • revise BMPs/EMPS Monitor and document • document implementation of BMPs/EMPs

While implementing BMPs and EMPs helps mitigate and manage potential environmental impacts, environmental stewardship is also an important aspect in the management of risks to a club's reputation, its relationship with the wider community and regulators and its ongoing liability and financial viability.

Proactive management of potential issues is also more cost-effective than reactive clean up and rebuilding of relationships with the wider community.

The Guidelines and toolkit will be available by the end of June 2017 so member clubs can start Stage 1 of the risk management process. An education, consultation and feedback program between SCA and our Clubs will be an integral part of the implementation process.

It is in the best interest of SCA member clubs to recognise the growing legal, regulatory and public concern about how our activities may affect the environment. Clubs should neither ignore nor be frightened by the growing attention to these issues as they can easily be identified and addressed through a well-established risk assessment process. Addressing these concerns proactively provides an opportunity for Clubs to demonstrate their commitment to environmental stewardship and proactively manage their environmental and financial liabilities.

A lot of thanks goes out their members who volunteer for the event, without them it would not have happened. Congratulations to the winner Sox Pilipasidis 191/200 National Champion. Congratulations Queenslander's Damien Birgan 4th overall, Brett Chambellant 3rd A Grade, Clayton Petersen 2nd B Grade, Robert Hooper 2nd and Mark Hughes 3rd C Grade, Maree Birgan 3rd Ladies and Billy Cain 3rd Sub Juniors. Well done to you all.

The 2016 State team of Damien Birgan, Peter Tobin, James McIver, Chambellant, Maree Birgan, Mike Birgan and junior Billy Cain were placed Second to Victoria once again. Third place were New South Wales. Well done team.

2016 was final year of a three year Qld Government funding. This funding was used across all branches of the association to help achieve better management and profile, growth and coaching. A Club Coach Course was delivered in Childers in March with three new coaches receiving accreditation. The funding was also used by the committee in the areas of growth, junior support, training and management of the association. I wish to thank Glen Rider and Kathy Cain for attending as our delegates to Sporting Clays Australia AGM in November 2016. I was unable to attend this meeting as I had just arrived back from an event in Italy the day before the meeting. SCA are moving forward very well at present with a good financial base backing the association.

All branches have had a fairly good year with consistent numbers with Brisbane leading the way with a healthy increase in participation across all their events. 2017 sees English Sporting Nationals shot in Brisbane on the 3rd and 4th June so once again Queensland members will have the chance to compete at the highest level of competition without traveling long distances.

I thank the committee and the workers, with a special thanks to Secretary - Ashley Mead and Treasurer - Sue Farrow for your outstanding commitment to Sporting Clays.

BROKEN HILL FIELD AND GAME NEWS


By "Shellshocked"

He did it again at the big Mornington CTC event with a score of 190/200, Adam Shale

pushed him all the way to be only one off the pace at the finish.

I have a meeting coming up with the EPA regarding pollution on shooting ranges, fortunately SCA are pro-active in this instance and I attended a meeting last week in Brisbane with an expert in this field and SCA have contracted to have him prepare guidelines for all clubs who have a problem with lead shot and target debris.

We are prepared to see what EPA will require of clubs regarding this issue.

Also while in Brisbane the SCA Executive met and spent two days preparing planning documents of where we go and what we wish to do for our members into the foreseeable future. We have taken huge strides in the last two years and we will develop our sport even further into the future.

You will see the results from this in the near future.

We have now reached capacity with entries at all of the major SCA events and there was discussion on how we can cater for larger attendances but at the same time keeping the quality and variety we require in the targets we shoot in competition. Some changes to procedures will be required to achieve this.

If you wish to participate in any of the SCA Majors, I advise you to get in early to avoid disappointment.

Bendigo Clay Target Club have been accepted as a member of VSCA and we welcome them aboard.

We still have a number of members who have not put their profile onto the Sporting Clays Australia website.

Online is the only way that memberships both new and those renewing can be purchased.

For those having difficulty, there are prompts and a video on the website to assist you.

If still you cannot handle it or do not have access to a computer, VSCA will forward to those who have not completed their profile a form that will list all the necessary information required to be a member.

On the return of this form we will then register you on the club computer.

We do not want to lose you as a member due to the fact that that you do not have a computer.
