Hunting and Habitat Report - by Howard Barks



DUCK SEASON

Duck season is here again. Victoria, South Australia and Tasmania have all enjoyed a good spell this year. Hope our members have taken advantage of the opportunity and have "bagged out". Quail season continues in South Australia until the 13 August.

Congratulations to the South Australian Field & Game Association and those providing a fantastic incentive for hunters to put in their hunter report forms.

FIREARM LEGISLATION

State Governments' actions to implement all or parts of the February "National Firearm Agreement" (NFA) need to be monitored carefully. It has already affected our clay target shooting members who own semi-automatic shotguns as well as hunters in some states where changes to lever-action shotgun regulation has also taken place. Sporting Clays Australia is pursuing the section of the Agreement regarding semi-automatic shotguns. I urge all members and state associations to take an active interest in the NFA. It is available to download from the Commonwealth Attorney General's website if you Google National Firearms Agreements 2017 or email me on hbsm7@bigpond.com and I will forward it.

WESTERN AUSTRALIA

I'm very pleased to advise the West Australian Field & Game Association (WAFGA) has signed a memorandum of understanding with the Department of Parks & Wildlife (DPaW) which sees WAFGA as a recognised hunting organisation.

Over time, this is expected to provide more opportunities for members of WAFGA clubs to participate in feral animal control on lands managed by DPaW once a member is accredited. W.A. members can email me on hbsm7@bigpond.com if you wish to become accredited.

This is something other State organisations can do to expand the range of hunting opportunities for their members.

The rainbow lorikeet "season" has come to a virtual close with the tally of around 450 well down on last season of nearly 3,400. Fruit growers in the Swan Valley are very appreciative of WAFGA members' efforts to help eradicate the bird, which is a declared pest in the region.

RIVERS AND WATERS

Thanks to Peter Teakle, we have the following information regarding rivers and wetlands, which are so important to the continuation of duck seasons throughout the country.

Alongside most gun cabinets, there are generally fishing rods and other gear, including devices of various shapes and sizes to keep the weekend's catch cold.

Let's cast a thought over the value of water – wetlands, rivers and lakes – that have been and will be the realm for keen shooters and fishers across all states for years to come. Recent field trips in the Murray Darling Basin have seen the environment bounce back following the drought, although the River Darling Ana branch hasn't flowed for three years and is in a poor degraded state, the Commonwealth Water Holder allocated lifesaving environmental flows has seen the system regenerated with thousands of waterbirds... and fish.

Queensland and New South Wales creeks and rivers, including the Barwon and many others, are the engine room for most of the fish species in the Murray River where there's been little recruitment over the last three years. Timely, but thought provoking, of the value of our precious pastimes – whether it be target shooting, fishing or hunting – and how we enjoy it. Why have an empty esky?

2017 FITASC OCEANIA CHAMPIONSHIP

A record field of 127 competitors competed in New Caledonia at the 29th FITASC Oceania Championship from April 7-9, with the host nation making up the majority of entries. Sporting Clays is now well supported in New Caledonia and the results show their standard is lifting to new highs.

The enormous effort that had gone in to make this a great and memorable event was noticeable when I arrived at Club de Tir Calédonien the day before the competition commenced; the grounds were presented like a golf course in their presentation.

The event was conducted over eight "Old Style FITASC Layouts" and the target setters had made great use of the fantastic terrain available. The Club had invested in a number of new La Porte Traps and even had a trap mechanic out from France to make sure the competition was faultless and ran like clockwork. The locals offered their assistance and gave me free rein to review the targets set for the shoot, allowing me to move some stands and adjust the trajectories to provide more variety and ensure the targets were tough – but not unbreakable. The comments from many of the competitors was that the event was one of the great Oceania Championships. Congratulations to all who made this such a memorable occasion.

DAY ONE

Each night brought heavy rainfall in Paita and this continued even on the drive out. When the shooting got started the weather was fine, but hot and steamy.

Open

Damien Birgan set the pace early on Day One with 68/75 followed by Anthony Panetta on 66/75, Junior Mathew Wilesmith with 65/75 and Geoff Wells with 64/75 showing they were the main contenders. Adam Green from New Zealand arrived late in the afternoon as the airports in NZ had been closed due to flooding. Considering the extreme circumstances, the Shoot Jury allowed him to go out with a Referee and shoot his three first-day rounds to catch up to the field, putting in a great effort to tie with Damien in the lead with 68/75.

DAY TWO

Open

Damien Birgan continued on with 69/75 for a total of 137/150, Adam Green slipped back a little with 135/150 and sharing third place was Yann Blanquet (New Caledonia) and Anthony Panetta on 134/150. The performance from New Cal shooter Yann Blanquet was amazing as he scored 25, 23, 23 for a day's total of 71/75.

Junior

Matt Wilesmith held on to his lead finishing the day on 129/150 followed by Luke Willemsen and Billy Cain on equal second with 127/150 after Billy came back into the race with an impressive 68/75.

Ladies

The race was on. Anna Hirchfield forged to the front with a total of 118/150 ahead of Tara Lawrence on 116/150 and Felicity Paglia on 115/150.

Veterans

The Veterans were also shooting neck and neck. Bob Brown was joined in the lead by Philippe Simoni on 123/150 with John Leach one target behind on 122/150.









Super Veterans

Alan Backman was the clear leader on 127/150, with Gordon MacPhee and Ross Christian tied for second on 118/150.

DAY THREE

With only Alan Backman cruising into the third day with a clear lead, all the other Categories promised exciting finishes and victory would go to those who held their composure throughout the day.

Open

Damien Birgan went out hard and posted a score of 43/50 to total 182/200. After shooting 43/50, Yann Blanquet fell five targets short with 177/150, leaving it all up to Adam Green to challenge Damien. Adam turned in a 24/25 in his first round, meaning a 23/25 would ensure a shoot-off for the Championship. Adam proceeded to keep breaking targets and with the last double to shoot he was on a possible 23/25 to force a shoot-off. Unfortunately, the last target escaped and Adam had to settle for second. But what a great effort: cancelled flight, flying in late on day one of the competition, having to shoot his first three rounds with only a Referee. We take our hats off to you, Adam.

Juniors

Here's where the excitement was. Mathew Wilesmith finished with 172/200, leaving Luke Willemsen to shoot 45/50 to force a shoot-off. After a first round 20/25 this seemed unlikely, but then Luke proceeded to shoot an amazing 25/25 to trigger the tie and make it a shoot-off for the Junior Title, which Mathew won by two targets. Billy Cain came home strong to finish on 170/200 to claim third place.

Ladies

Tara Lawrence held it together to finish on 157/200 to give New Zealand a well-deserved gold medal. Anna Hirchfield came in second on 153/200 and Felicity Paglia in third on 152/200.

Veterans

Bob Brown hit a clean 25 break on the last day to post 168/200, taking the win from John Leach on 165/200 and Philippe Simoni on 163/200.

Super Veterans

Alan Backman was the runaway winner here with 170/200 over Gordon MacPhee on 160/200 and Ross Christian in third on 154/200.

TEAM RESULTS


Australia was successful in winning all the Team events. Congratulations to all our Team Members on such a fantastic achievement.

INTERVIEW WITH DAMIEN BIRGAN WINNER OF THE 29TH FITASC OCEANIA SPORTING CHAMPIONSHIPS

Have you ever shot over in New Caledonia before this year's Oceanias?

Yes, I've attended all the Oceanias in New Caledonia including the first one in 1996. They've all been in Païta, except for the last one in 2014 which was in Koumac in the north of New Caledonia. All have been great shoots and it's also a great holiday destination

What did you think of Club de Tir Calédonien?

The shooters from the Païta Club did a fantastic job! The grounds were amazing as always. The New Caledonians made you feel like you were part of the Club and go so far out of their way to make you feel welcome.

Did you do any special prep for the Oceanias?

No specific prep; just coaching on the weekends and some monthly shoots on Sundays.

How did you find the targets at the comp? Were any stations more difficult than others?

I thought the targets were absolutely world class. Club de Tir Calédonien have one of the best grounds in the Oceania region with fantastic terrain to shoot old style FITASC. I personally found seven of the eight layouts to be of similar difficulty, with the exception of layout 1 which was a little wind-affected on the Friday afternoon. I found that one to be quite tough but Billy Cain shot a brilliant 24/25 on the same layout on Saturday so perhaps I'm getting a bit soft in my age.

Were you confident in taking out the win or was it down to the wire the whole way through?

I wasn't confident at all. I felt I shot steady on most of the layouts, but

not up to where I would say I was happy with. It was a slog right down to the last pair.

What were the standout performances?

The first one that comes to mind is my mate Yann Blanquet (New Caledonia) with his third place overall and Adam Green's (NZ) second place as well.

The Junior shoot-off was also a pleasure to watch with a display of what's to come in the not too distant future.

Tell us: what do you shoot with and what's in your kit?

GUN: I currently use a Perazzi MX2000S 32" fixed choke 1/2 and 3/4.

GLASSES: I've been wearing Pilla glasses for nearly 10 years and use the Outlaw with an N66 most of the time.

CARTRIDGES: I shoot B&P F2 HV and have been a big fan of 7.5s for a long time; I've found the shot size covers most situations.

Top Shot Industries has also supplied me with some sweet shooting apparel and have some really nice wild hare bags and slips.

You've been named in the Australian Team again this year. How does this impact your 2017 season? Any goals you're out to achieve?

I'm stoked to be part of the new-look Australian team going to the FITASC Worlds in Hungry. My only goal is to represent the Open Team to the best of my ability and if I do well as an individual, that would be a bonus. I would also like to add that if any of the Team wants to chat or needs advice on anything shooting related – I'm here to help.

2017 COMPAK NATIONALS

2017 has been a great year for those who have followed the major Sporting Clays events so far.

After the Australian Grand Prix and what was a fantastic start to the local season in March, the weekend of May 3rd and 4th was again the chance for Warrnambool SSAA (Laang) to show us what they could do. It was another 200 target event conducted over four FITASC Compak Sporting Fields. Three of the layouts had a program of three singles and one double per stand, the other had one single and two doubles per stand. The competition was again sponsored by GB Corsivia, and we thank Bruce Burns and his team for their continued support of Sporting Clays Australia.

DAY ONE

Saturday started off with calm weather but heavy showers did come in throughout the day. Fortunately, each time it rained my squad was either in the clubhouse or sitting in vehicles waiting for our turn to shoot. No matter what the weather, it was great to see the Queenslanders shivering as they're not used to the balmy sort of conditions that Warrnambool can provide at the drop of a hat.

The weather certainly didn't affect the competition, with good scores coming in off all layouts.

Opens: Socrates "Sox" Pilipasidis was the standout with 97/100, followed by Chris Brown (just off the plane from San Antonio) on 95/100 and a host of others still in with a chance.

Ladies: Renae Birgan was back leading the Ladies with 83/100, just clear of new talent April Thompson on 77/100 and Anna Hirchfield sitting in third with 70/100.

Juniors: Mark DuRose was the standout with 91/100, but the Cain boys were in hot pursuit with Billy on 89/100, Mitchell on 85/100 and Reece on 82/100.

Veterans: John Leach was way out in front on 93/100, with Ron Rhook 88/100 and Robert Passarin chasing.

Super Veterans: A tight competition saw Colin Barker and Ray McFarlane tied in front on 84/100, with Allan Backman just one behind on 83/100.

DAY TWO


Sunday was cold, but reasonably fine, and so the show went on.

Opens: Sox shot 95/100 to keep hold of the lead, going into the six person final with a total of 192/200 followed by Chris Brown 189/200, Jack Gibbs and Brenton Irons 188/200, and Brian Mortensen and Adam DuRose 185/200.

The targets were altered to be a little more difficult and the start of the final was signalled with the firing of a 55mm cannon courtesy of Brian Cockayne. It may have only been loaded with a wooden plug (a lead ball would fly 3km plus) but the noise was enough to give anyone a heart attack.

Sox was first away and let his opening target, a battue from trap E, escape. That was his only blemish though and he shot the rest for a 24/25 total of 216/225 to become the 2017 Compak Nationals Champion. Brenton was clear second after shooting 21/25 for a total of 209, leaving Jack, Chris and Brian all tied on a total of 207/225. Unfortunately Adam was eliminated.

Chris was first away in the final shoot-off and let his second target, an F target off the tower, escape. Jack cleaned the stand and Brian missed his last, putting Jack into 3rd place and Brian 4th.



Ladies: Renae was back in fine form and took out first place with a convincing 174/200. Second and third was much closer, with April finishing up with 149 and Anna on 148.

Juniors: Mark (182/200) kept his foot on the pedal and took home the win with a ten target buffer from Billy (172/200) and Reece another three targets back (169/200).

Veterans: Ron Rhook and Robert Passarin came home strong to finish up on 177/200 at the end of normal competition. Ron came out on top by one target in the shoot-off to claim first position from Robert. John's total was 175/200 for third place.

Super Veterans: Another shoot-off after Colin Barker and Allan Backman were tied on 164/200. Colin claimed first place by one target from Allan in second, with Ray on third after hitting 160/200.

We, as shooters and competitors, are being spoilt by the quality of the targets and organisation we are able to enjoy at the major SCA events. Entry numbers are close to capacity, with most categories selling out, and we continue to benefit from the support of our event partners. The ongoing effort and hospitality displayed by the host Clubs and their teams of volunteers must also be applauded.

The next major is the English Sporting Nationals hosted by Brisbane Sporting Clays. The event will most likely have been and gone by the time this edition is delivered, so I hope plenty of you made your way to Queensland to have a shot.

The one not to miss this year is the SCA Sporting Nationals from September 8th to 10th. Held at Echidna Park near Geraldton, this will virtually be a "Green Fields Site" as it's the first major event to be conducted on the property of lan Grant, the Echidna Park President. The last edition of the magazine provided details and photos of what you can expect around the grounds and what's available in the nearby township of Geraldton. It's shaping up to be another of the great competitions conducted under the SCA banner. Love to see you all there!







2017 ENGLISH SPORTING NATIONALS

BRISBANE QLD | 3-4 JUNE 2017

What a great time to host an event in Queensland: sunny days, no humidity, just perfect weather. The English Sporting National event for 2017 was granted to Brisbane Sporting Clays as the host club to provide another National event for SCA members.

The competition was set over two grounds with 14 stations to shoot 100 targets each day. Each ground was named after the event sponsor – GB and Corsivia. English Sporting, as the advertisement on the SCA Facebook page says, is a discipline where "the clays go smashing two by two". Well that was the expectation anyway. English Sporting has a different format to our usual FITASC competitions and if you miss with the first shot you are 50% down on the score of a pair (FITASC has "Doubles", English Sporting has "Pairs"). When you have the Pair three or four times in a row and you can't work it out quickly – holes start to show up in your final score. The benefits of shooting this discipline are obvious; it makes you better at picking your sweet spot to break the clays time and again, making your shooting more consistent with first barrel breaks which translates into FITASC as well. It certainly shows how much we sometimes depend on our second barrel breaks.

DAY ONE

The first day's competition had the competitors lining up at the noms hut waiting to sign in and get out onto the ranges. Odd number squads were sent to layout one (Corsivia) and evens to layout two (GB). If anyone was thinking the courses were going to be set on the soft side because it was English Sporting, it quickly became apparent that this was not going to be a walk in the park. There were some serious targets out there and you had to work at it to keep the scores showing up on the score card. Every angle, swirl and curl of the target was considered, from going away to a sim pair of driven overheads from the boom lift members were first introduced to at the Nationals in October last year (the lift was only at half-mast; there was another 15 metres still to reach full height!). There was a great turn out from our interstate members as well as an international visitor from New Caledonia.

The first day ran to programme with shooting completed early afternoon, allowing the competitors time to enjoy the rest of the day and head home.

Billy Cain and **Billy Zogogiannis** were at the top of the leader board after the first one hundred on 90/100.

Veterans – Bob Brown from Victoria on 84/100

Super Vets – Colin Barker on 73/100

Ladies - Maree Birgan on 69/100

A Grade – Scott O'Brien on 81/100

B Grade - Paul Smidt on 70/100

C Grade - Olindo Mazzarotto on 72/100

There was room for movement with no one running away with a position. Special mention to Anthony Panetta who shot the Corsivia Ground straight. Well done Anthony!

DAY TWO

The courses were reset with extra traps brought in, shooting positions shifted and new menus placed out. Competition got underway and squads were sent out to the opposite of their Saturday start. There were totally different layouts to day one and it was game on. The leader board remained fairly static from the Saturday, with Billy Cain holding on to his overall lead finishing on 182/200, three clear of Peter Tobin on 179/100. Billy Zogogiannis dropped back finishing on 168/200. The Ladies and Veterans remained as-is with the same leaders as Saturday. After the last score card came back it became apparent no shoot-offs were needed to decide the grades or categories. All that was required to complete the Competition was to prepare a shoot-off area for the Super Final. The top six names to go forward were Billy Cain 182/200, Peter Tobin 179/200, Damien Birgan 177/200, Chris Brown 177/20, Jason Pole 174/200 and Jamie Dunn 173/200.

It was a fairly challenging final 25 bird shoot-off for the six top shooters, which saw Chris Brown take first-place honours over Peter Tobin and Billy Cain. Chris' solid performance taking down 19 targets secured his second National Championship title for 2017 after winning the Australian Grand Prix in March. Congratulations to Chris for taking home the win, to Peter for holding on to second and to Billy for showing he's got what it takes to challenge the competition.



RULES CORNER

- Ray McFarlane

There has been some confusion about the various rules of FITASC Sporting, FITASC Compak Sporting and English Sporting regarding the way that Doubles are to be shot and scored in each discipline.

FITASC Sporting

Simultaneous or Rafale Double

In any Simultaneous or Rafale Double the targets may be shot in any order. You may shoot both shots at the one target. If both targets are broken by the one shot, either on the first or second shot, the score is "one-one".

Double on Report

If a shooter misses the first target and fires the second shot at the first target and breaks it, the score is recorded as "one-lost". If both targets are broken by the second shot the score is recorded as "one-one".

NOTE: On a Repeat Double where the score on the first target has been noted and a new Double is thrown to establish the result of the second shot, the shooter must make a reasonable attempt to place the first shot in

FITASC Compak Sporting

In Compak Sporting the scoring of Doubles is different than that for FITASC Sporting.

a similar position as they shot it in the original

Rule 2.5.3 In any Double, both targets must be shot at. It is prohibited to fire two shots at the one target of any Double.

Simultaneous Double

double.

The targets may be shot in any order. If both targets are broken in one shot, the Double is declared as "no-targets" with no score established. The Double must be repeated for a result on both targets.

Explanation: In Compak Sporting you must fire a shot at every target; double barrelling of the one target on any Double is prohibited.

English Sporting

Single targets are allowed to be thrown as double barrel targets.

In Doubles, the shooter may fire both shots at the one target as in FITASC Sporting. Doubles rules for scoring are the same as FITASC Sporting.

A maximum of 10 targets can be thrown from the one shooting stand.

Report Doubles

Rule 24.22 When re-shooting a Report Double for a result on the second target, the competitor must make a reasonable attempt to break the first target before attempting to shoot and break the second target.

Rule 24.23 Referees must ensure that competitors adhere strictly to rule 24.22. If a violation of the rule takes place, the Referee shall ask the competitor to repeat the Double (1st target score established). If the competitor violates rule 24.22 on three occasions, then at the third occasion the second target of the Double will be declared "lost".

BUSH SKEET

The first Sunday of May saw the second running of "Bush Skeet" at the Cooma Field and Game Range at Middlingbank. Skeet is not a discipline typically shot at a Field and Game club but it does involve clay targets and shotguns so the Club has decided to run a couple of events in the normal sporting clays calendar.

"Bush Skeet" is essentially run under American skeet rules but not in open space as would traditionally be the case. 




