HUNTING AND HABITAT UPDATE

We do not receive Australia-wide feedback so hope members are getting out hunting and their share of ducks and quail during the current seasons.

We have been very busy in Western Australia with a number of projects, one of which is rainbow lorikeet control. These pretty birds are not native to south-west WA and are a declared pest. During the 2017/18 summer, WAFGA members destroyed 3797 birds which was very much appreciated by fruit growers in the Perth region where these pests cause substantial economic losses to growers and have a very adverse effect on our native birds by taken over nesting hollows. There is now an emerging problem with rainbow lorikeets in Tasmania, so perhaps an opportunity for TFGA members in the "Apple Isle" to do the community a service and get involved before the rainbow lorikeet population gets out of control as it has in Perth.

WAFGA members are actively involved in corella control in country locations where these birds are causing problems for the community. I am sure WA is not the only state to have this problem, so there is possibly an opportunity for members in other states to get on board. In May I was invited to attend a seminar organised by the Western Australian Local Government Association and the Parks and Wildlife Service to discuss control methods and it will be interesting to discuss different control methods with other hunters.

We are endeavouring to become more effective in feral cat control and to that end I shall be attending a feral cat seminar at the end of May and hope to learn more about cat control. I am happy to share any information gained with any state that is interested .We need to be much more active in this area as feral cats are having a devastating effect on our native fauna across Australia.

In pastoral areas we will be continuing our feral herbivore and wild dog control once the cattle mustering season is completed, so from August members will have an opportunity to "go bush".

We continue to work with the Department of Biodiversity Conservation and Attractions e.g. Parks and Wildlife Service on projects to control feral animals in national parks and conservation areas. Similar opportunities exist in all states and it would be fantastic to hear what is going on around Australia. Active H&H groups will help gain and retain members. Get out and about, do something good for the environment; it will make a change from cracking clays!

Good hunting, stay safe.

COACHING DIRECTOR'S REPORT

With the pressures of the 2018 Grand Prix now behind me, I was able to concentrate on my role as Coaching Director.

I have corresponded with the states about their current list of coaches and the need for some coaches on that list to be reaccredited. On this front there is some progress with State Directors beginning to hold sessions to renew their club coaches' qualifications. However, since a state-level Coaching Director

position is required to sign off on new and renewing club coaches, the lack of such a position puts any training in these states in a deadlock. States must try their best to recruit someone into the position, but being realistic, this is just not always possible and getting willing volunteers to commit to such a time intensive role is difficult. The remaining fallback position, is that I, as the National Director, hold training sessions in those states lacking a State Director. This isn't an ideal solution, as current time commitments do not allow me the luxury of enough days free to travel and stage these events, not at least until later in the year. I will continue to try and urge states to appoint someone to this key role.

In my home state of SA there has been interest in members becoming club level coaches and I have already begun training sessions with more to follow in the coming months as I fill available time slots. I believe this will lead to us soon having a very healthy contingent of club level coaches here in South Australia. These coaches are greatly needed as we have a large number of new members looking for a way to get started in the sport.

BASTILLE DAY

Quick explanation of Bastille Day.

Bastille Day marks the storming of the Bastille prison by angry Parisian crowds.

This seismic act demonstrated that ordinary people would no longer accept the absolute power of the king and signalled the start of the French Revolution which forced the creation of the modern French Republic.

The July 14 "Fête de la Federation" - which marked the first anniversary of the storming of the Bastille - became a French national holiday in 1880 and has been observed ever since.

The main event is a military parade in Paris attended by the President of the Republic, currently Emmanuel Macron, who often invites other political leaders. President Trump is due to attend this year's parade to mark the 100th anniversary of the United States' entry into the first world war. Some 4,000 soldiers, police, firefighters and various military academies take part in the spectacle on Paris's famous Champs-Élysées. There is also a spectacular flypast involving notably the Alpha Jets of the Patrouille de France. In the evening fireworks light up the capital from the Eiffel Tower.

Elsewhere in France, villages, towns and cities host their own fireworks displays and dances.

2018 SCA ENGLISH SPORTING NATIONALS

It has been many years since Australian Sporting Clays (ASC) Sydney last held an SCA national title at their Menai shooting range. The club infrastructure has grown and they have made some serious purchases of traps, transmitting gear and equipment. This club would now have some of the most modern equipment in the country. This is one of the clubs that is starting to get on board and offer their members the chance to shoot often rather than just once a month. This can be hard for volunteers, but ASC Sydney seems to have the people power and support of its members with a growing membership. Well done Sydney. As they say if you build it, they will come!

There was a great turnout for the English Sporting discipline which is starting to gain momentum; the event was seven shy of maximum numbers allocated. Sydney has been promoting English Sporting through the year and it showed with the number of New South Wales members that nominated for the event.

A few weeks prior to this event a large bush fire was descending towards the club house and shooting grounds. Fortunately, the fire service got this potential disaster under control with some strategically cut fire breaks which stopped the fires progress. A few more runs with the D9 bulldozer would have worked wonders and opened up some more areas of the thick ground cover of bush and scrub trees for the club to shoot from. Despite this, the event was still on the right side of positive and the first day's shooting started bright and early with an 8.30am kick off. The weather was perfect and the wind leading up to the competition subsided, leaving perfect conditions for shooting.

The layouts had a few tricky pairs and it was easy to let one or two slip past. Matthew Libbis came out of the traps full of fire on the B course and shot the first 50 straight, setting the scene for everyone else to follow. Only eight perfect rounds were shot over the weekend and with Matthew claiming two of those the rest went to John Younger, Bill Zogogiannis, Socrates Pilipasidis, Andrew Bell, Renae Birgan and Billy Cain. After the first day Chris Brown was the leader on 92/100 followed by John Younger and Matthew Libbis on 89/100.

The second day started the same as the first, with perfect shooting weather. The run to the podium was fast and furious and with the final tally complete, it was time to rally the top six for the Super Final: John Younger, Chris Brown, Billy Zogogiannis, Robert Hall, Sox Pilipasidis and Matthew Libbis. With barely anything in it at the outset, managing to hit the pairs became critical to secure the title. John Younger maintained his dominance to take out first with an impressive 23/25. Bill Zogogiannis came home strong with 22/25 to jump into second, while Chris Brown (20/25) and Socrates Pilipasidis (22/25) both ended up on 200 so had a "tied" shoot-off for third and fourth. Chris left nothing behind with a score of 5/5 to edging out Sox on 4/5.



2018 FITASC OCEANIA CHAMPIONSHIPS

The popular Rotorua Rod & Gun Club was the venue for the 2018 FITASC Oceania Sporting Championships. With an entry of over 171 competitors the event was assured of being a success. In attendance were 51 Australians, 79 New Zealanders, 36 New Caledonians, 3 Tahitians and 2 from Finland.

Rotorua is ideally suited for "Old Style FITASC" events with the available terrain at its disposal. When you drive into the club you are on the top of a great escarpment and all the fantastic terrain is revealed when you walk past the clubhouse and look over the edge. The club had prepared eight parcours and the event was held over three days. Each parcours presented totally different targets and the preparations were a credit to the ground setters. The weather was great for Rotorua and this also added to the success of a great event.

DAY ONE

The New Zealand top guns started well with Geoff Wells and Adam Green posting possibles on their first round, but at the end of the day it was Chris Brown and Socrates Pilipasidis leading on 72/75 from Geoff Wells 70, Adam Green 69, and Nick Guerra and Cameron Kivinen on 68.

ΙΔΟΥ

Renae Birgan was again the leader with 63/75, Anna Hirchfield 61, April Thompson 58 and Vicki Johnstone 56.

JUNIOR

Matthew Wilesmith 69/75 was leading from the two Kiwi Juniors, Josh Pratt 66 and Keaton Norling on 65.

SENIOR

Des Coe was the leader with 66/75 with Derek Morgan and Chris Ball close behind on 65 and 64 consecutively.

VETERAN

Eddie Magee 62/75, Roger Kerslake 59, Allen Alley 58.

MASTER

Gordon MacPhee 60/75 was leading from Len Moule 54 and Max Kavanagh 53.

DAY TWO

The weather good again and the shooting was hotting up at the top. Chris and Sox both shot 70/75 to continue sharing the lead on 142/150. Close behind was Geoff Wells with 71/75, the best score of the day and one behind on 141. Adam Green 139 and Cameron Kivinen 138 were the best of the rest.

LADY

Renae with a great 70/75 total 133/150 was a clear leader from Anna Hirchfield 117, April Thompson 113 and Vicki Johnstone 111.

JUNIOR

Matthew Wilesmith 134/150 had a one target lead from Josh Pratt 133/150 ahead of Keaton Norling 129.

SENIOR

Des Coe was joined in the lead by Chris Ball and Derek Morgan, all on 133/150.

VETERAN

Eddie Magee 124/150 was holding on to top spot from Roger Kerslake 122 and Allen Alley 118.

MASTER

Gordon MacPhee 117/150 had a handy lead from Len Moule 114 and Max Kavanagh 111.

DAY THREE

Today was the day when the champions emerge. With "Old Style FITASC", nothing is confirmed until the final shot. Finally all shooters would have shot all of the parcours. The question was who was finishing on what were perhaps the easier layouts, and who had the harder finish? Well it proved that it would all go down to the wire.

Early favourites, Chris and Sox, both shot 46/50 for a total of 188/200 each and then along came the spoiler, with Nick Guerra 48/50 including a possible on the last parcours also 188/200. All eyes then went to Geoff Wells but with 46/50, he fell one agonising target behind on 187/200. Only one shooter could now upset the apple cart and it was Adam Green who needed a possible on layout 2 to tie. Not impossible, said all the onlookers. Geoff Wells and Josh Pratt (a Junior) both shot possibles on this layout. Unfortunately for Adam it was a bridge too far and he finished with a 22 and had to settle for equal fifth place together with Cameron Kivinen, Brian Deadman and Robert Hall. A three-way shootoff was to come to finalise all of the medal places in the Open category.

LADY

Renae was the runaway winner 179/200 with April Thompson 150/200 second and Vicki Johnstone 148/200 third.

ILINIOE

Matthew Wilesmith defended his title and finished on 179/200. Josh Pratt 176/200 and Keaton Norling 175/200 put on a great show to finish in the minor medals.

SENIOR

After a slow start on day one Chris Ball really put in on the last two days to finish with 180/200 from Des Coe 179/200 and Derek Morgan in third on 175/200.

VETERAN

Eddie Magee 171/200 took out the title from Roger Kerslake 163 and Allen Alley 155.

MASTER

Gordon MacPhee 157/200 was the easy winner of the new Master category from Max Kavanagh 148 and Len Moule 145.

SHOOTOFF FOR THE 2018 FITASC OCEANIA CHAMPIONSHIP

The ground setters had set up a difficult course with Stand 1 up on the top level, Stand 2 and 3 down on the bottom level, and Stand 4 back up the top level. They certainly put on some monster targets, especially the two stands on the top level.

STAND

The shooting order was Chris, Nick then Sox. Chris missed his first and cleaned the rest of the stand. Nick dropped his first two double barrels and cleaned the rest. Sox missed his second single and also dropped the double. Advantage Chris.

STAND 2

Down the bottom. Sox started and cleaned the stand. Next, Chris cleaned the singles and missed the second target of the double. Nick cleaned the singles and then dropped the complete double. The advantage was still with Chris by one target from Sox, and Nick two behind.











Nick started and he shot the singles and dropped the first target of the double. Both Chris and Sox do exactly the same. Chris held on to the advantage, one clear of Sox and two clear of Nick. You could hear the comments and with two behind people thought Nick was gone. But like a good book the last page can spring a surprise.

STAND 4

Onto the last stand and back up to the top of the hill. Three singles and two doubles. Certainly not easy and the hardest of the stands. Chris started with the singles and he broke them all. Next up was Nick and he also broke all the singles while Sox dropped one. Advantage Chris with one up on Sox and two up on Nick.

We are now down to the last two doubles. Nick started and with an awesome display of shooting he cleaned the stand to finish with 20/25. Next up was Sox and he dropped the first target of the second double, giving him 19/25. It was all up to Chris. He missed the first target for a 0-1 result. Now he needed to shoot the second double clean to win. He broke the first but the second target escapes. Sox was in third and it's down to Sudden Death for Chris and Nick. A coin was tossed to see who would lead off. Chris won the toss and decided to shoot first. The targets stiffened up a little and it was to be decided on single targets only; the first time a difference shows in the scores, the winner is to be declared.

Chris missed the first two singles. Nick missed the first and the broke the second target and was declared the winner. This is the first major success for Nick and it is an excellent run up to the 40th World FITASC Sporting Championships where he is part of the Open (Man) Team for Australia. Congratulations also to Chris and Sox. Well done.

To our Kiwi hosts, this was a fantastic event and enjoyed by all. Not only can they run a great event but the quality of shooters in New Zealand is also increasing rapidly; just look at the two Juniors who finished second and third. One other aspect of the event was the

timing of squads, some with eight in the squad. They had the Squad Times set at 50 minutes per squad, with the last squad timed to go out at 3.10pm. It actually took 60 minutes per squad, a total of nine hours of shooting. On the first two days shooting finished just in time to beat the going down of the sun. It was a credit to the organisers that this was achieved. For the most part, shooters obeyed the timing limit of 15 seconds per squad. Some of our Australian shooters who seem to take forever to shoot their targets could take a leaf out of the New Zealand approach to shooting.

It was indeed a pleasure to officiate as the FITASC Representative for Oceania at this event. Very little changes were made to the targets presented for the event by Rotorua Rod and Gun Club and all the ground staff and the office crew were a delight to work with. Thank you.

I would also like to congratulate all those Australians who were awarded an Oceania Cup. Your success at this level is recognition of your ongoing commitment to the sport and your success is well deserved.

Were you confident you'd perform well at the FITASC Oceania Championships? Did you set yourself any goals heading into it?

I was confident I would shoot well, but probably not that I would win. I had a goal that I wanted to finish in the top five.

What was your preparation like?

Pretty good. I had been shooting reasonably well at our State Selection Shoots this year so far and had also recently made it into the Australian Team for the World Championships in France, so had a reasonable amount of confidence.

Had you shot at the Rotorua Rod and Gun Club before?

I had shot there once previously as a Junior and could remember it being an amazing place. It's a fantastic venue for an international event as they have unbelievable terrain and enough space to hold eight separate grounds, especially for "Old Style FITASC".

How did you find the layouts for the Oceanias? I thought that it was a fairly consistent level of

difficultly across all layouts. Probably Layout 2 and 6 where slightly tougher. I enjoyed Layout 1 the most.

Who were the standout shooters for you?

Chris (Brown) and Sox obviously shot great from start to finish, but Geoff Wells was shooting really well also. I was in his squad and if it wasn't for a few hiccups on the last layout I think he would have finished at the top as well.

There was obviously some big talent there. You had to take out a three-way shootoff to claim the win, and there were only six targets between the top 10 competitors. cont'd top of page

Did it literally take until the last few targets before you felt like you were in the winner's spot? Yes, for sure. Honestly, I didn't think I was really in a position to get a place until I shot 25 in the last round and saw Geoff miss a couple, which put me one ahead of him. At that point I thought I would be very close to a top three finish but still thought Sox or Chris would have won.

You've been on the podium at the Oceanias as a Junior and now you're the 2018 Oceania Champion. What's the journey been like?

As a Junior I used to follow the Sporting Clays circuit fairly regularly, however after I turned 21 I really went away from Sporting Clays and mainly chased game and the odd local FGA shoot. In the last two years I have started chasing Sporting Clays again on a more regular basis. To be honest I still don't shoot as much as I would like to, so it was really good to achieve a result like this.

You've also been named in the Australian Team this year. What are your plans for the World Championships?

This is my first time in the team. Obviously, the plan is to shoot as consistent as I have been recently and see what happens from there.

What a season of Universal Trench 2018 turned out to be. Never in our wildest dreams did we expect this fun, exciting discipline to take off in Australia as well as it has. This season we trialled a new online booking system where a shooter could not only enter online, but also select the squad number and shooting position they wished to start in. What a hit and godsend this proved to be for all concerned.

With 276 entries, 4 clubs, 2 new Australian records, 1 equal Australian record and a lot of fun, 2018 has been a fantastic year all round.

We kicked off at Frankston Australian Clay Target Club (FACTC) with a record crowd of 95 shooters, meaning we had to cut the event back to 150 targets. While we know cutting targets back isn't ideal, it is a good problem to have and we thank the shooters for their understanding. Some amazing scores were recorded with Danny Di Pietro and Vinnie Mollica shooting off with 147/150 and Danny coming out on top. Michelle Beecham won the Ladies with 133 (apologies to Michelle for not having her listed as a winner in a previous article). Thomas Armstrong, last year's Junior World Champ, won the Juniors with 145 and Phil Matthews took out the Veterans with 143/150. A big thank you to FACTC and to Winchester Australia for sponsoring this round

Round 2 saw us return back to Cecil Park Clay Target Club in February and 70 shooters entered for the weekend. It was great to be able to use three layouts for the event, ensuring the smooth running of the shoot. Some big scores were recorded over the first 150 targets and then the weather took a turn for the worse, leaving the \$1000 up for grabs from Shane Pinner and Andrew Brady for an Australian Record to be broken unclaimed. Charlton Vella came out on top with 195/200, Mitch lles the Junior with 193, his grandfather Bill the Veterans with 187/200 and Suzy Corry the Ladies with 185/200. Thank you Cecil Park and Bornaghi Australia for sponsoring the event.

Round 3 was held in March in Adelaide at the International Clay Target Club (International CTC) with 43 shooters and proved to be a tough affair for most, except for Nathan Cassells who recorded a truly world class score of 194/200 in some tough conditions to win by three targets from the ever improving Aaron Zupanic. Martin Collumb was the Veterans winner with 190/200, Amanda Holt the Ladies with 182 and the Juniors proved to be a great spectacle with Tom Armstrong and Nathan Argiro both tied on 186. In the shootoff both boys shot a clean round of 25 and then went to sudden death single barrel before











Nathan came out on top a further six targets later. It was great to watch. A big thank to all involved at International CTC and Polyaire for their sponsorship.

Round 4 in April saw the final held again at Melbourne Gun Club in some of the best conditions ever experienced for UT in Australia and boy did the records plummet. Sixty-eight shooters entered the event and it wasn't long til the red ink hit the scoreboard. At the end of the 200 targets Matt Schiller from Young, NSW had extended the Australian Record of 196/200 out to 198 with a great display of UT shooting to win the Australian National Title. But the records didn't end there with Phil Matthews recording an excellent 193/200 to break the Australian Veterans record, Thomas Armstrong a 196/200 to equal the Junior Australian record and Suzy Corry a 187/200 to claim the Ladies National Title. Some amazing shooting and a big thanks to everyone at Melbourne Gun Club and also Perazzi Australia for their support. Nathan Cassells won the Mialls Gunshop prize for Overall High Gun and Aaron Zupanic won the Top Shot Industries award for the most improved. Well done guys.






In comparison, on the driven range the birds would be coming overhead in numerous directions.

- 1. Extension to club rooms and internal refurbishments
- 2. A JLG boom lift that extends to 28 metres
- 3. 3 x Compak Sporting layouts which includes 18 new traps
- 3 x Progetti Acoustic release systems for the Compak Sporting
- Computerised scoring for events with two large display screens

This has been a huge program for the few club members who have been involved in the construction of the new facilities and I thank them sincerely for their efforts in bringing the project to fruition. Electricians, roof plumbers, carpenters, painters and other assistants have given up their time. Our next project, if approved, will be the refurbishment of our kitchen and its facilities

I would also like to thank the individual members who have assisted with the set-up of traps and grounds for all of our competitions.

Assisting your club is a thankless task and many take the efforts of the few who provide the necessary workforce to keep this club going as the work and responsibility of others.

As the Financial Report from our Treasurer will show, we are in a very good position and have a healthy bank balance. Most of the money made by the club is due to us being the recognised distributors of Promatic Traps in Australia. As we run a business, all club functions are subject to payment of GST. We also have lease payments to the property owner. Just with those two incidentals, each and every entry to shoot at the range incurs an initial cost to the entry fee of \$13 per entry.

This does not leave a lot of money for the other costs incurred by the club i.e. purchase of targets, upkeep of equipment, supply of prizes, fueling of the generator, etc.

In conclusion I wish to thank two people. Firstly, Jason Charlton of JC Scaffolding who has generously provided us with the imposing scaffolding structure for one of our Compak Sporting Layouts; it certainly gives us another perspective and allows us to shoot targets beneath our feet. The other is our Treasurer, Steven, who does a remarkable job and keeps a strict eye on all of our financial obligations.


