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HUNTING AND HABITAT UPDATE

GAME BIRD SEASON

For those States fortunate to participate in a game bird harvest details are:

VICTORIA

Season starts 0900 on 16th March and finishes on 19th May

Permitted birds are Pacific black duck, Mountain duck, Chestnut teal, Grey teal, Pink eared duck, Wood duck and Hard head.

Bag limits have changed - 4 on opening day thereafter 5 per day until the end of season .

Full details - Victorian Game Management Authority

SOUTH AUSTRALIA

Duck season starts 16th March and runs until 31st August.

Permitted birds are Grey Teal, Black Duck, Mountain Duck, Wood Duck, Pink eared and Hardhead.

Bag limit 8 per day.

Quail season commences 16th March and runs until 31st August.

Bag limit 15 per day. Can only be taken on private land with permission of the landholder.

Full details - South Australian Dept. of Environment

Please ensure you have passed the W.I.T test and have the appropriate license for the State you wish to shoot.

WESTERN AUSTRALIA

The regulations regarding the taking of Mountain Duck & Wood duck radically changed on 1st January 2019. It is now a requirement for a farmer who has a problem with these two species to apply to the Dept of Bio-Security, Conservation & Attractions for a license to shoot these birds.

Cost to the farmer for a license is \$65.00 The farmer can allow others to shoot on their property once a license has been issued.

NEW ZEALAND FITASC GRAND PRIX

FEBRUARY 2019

100 entries were received for this event with 44 Australians competing of which the majority were continuing onto Waikato for the NZ National Sporting Championships.

The weather was fantastic for the two days of the event and the grounds were situated on grassed sand dunes, this provided great terrain for throwing of the various trajectories required for FITASC sporting events.

Grounds 1 & 2 were set well with varied trajectories to challenge the shooters, Grounds 3 & 4 were a little soft and were squeezed into tight areas where targets from other stands were visible to the shooters. On Day 1 wind did cause problems on these two grounds especially incoming targets set low to the ground that did not make the distance and were virtually one shot targets.

The performance of the shooters was amazing with the shooting of 50 targets to a visit there were a number of 50/50 shot. This was exceptional scoring especially those that were shot on Grounds 1 & 2.

John Younger started it off with a 50/50 for his 1st 2 rounds of the competition on the challenging grounds 1 & 2. Scores on day 1 were exceptional with Younger leading on 97/100, Jack Gibbs, Cameron Kivinen 1 target back on 96/100, Brian Deadman was the best of the Kiwi's with 94/100.

Day 2 and the shooting only got better, Jack Gibbs shott 50/50 on grounds 1 & 2 as did Brian Deadman and Anthony Panetta, you may think that the targets were soft but the changes made by Craig Matthews assisted by our Simon Hore were extensive and world class. Although grounds 3 & 4 unfortunately were softened from day 1, the following were also able to produce 50/50 scores on these layouts, Cameron Kivinen, Brian Deadman and Anthony Panetta.

In the FITASC events there was only 1 shoot-off between Cameron Kivinen and John Younger for 1st and 2nd in the Open, Cameron on some exceptionally hard targets shot a fantastic 24/25 to emerge as the Silver Medallist.

A great event, conducted exceptionally well by the host club Wanganui, shooting run to the advertised time table and with little fuss, well done.

2ND ASIAN FITASC SPORTING CHAMPIONSHIP & 3RD ASIAN COMPAK CHAMPIONSHIP

PHOTHARAM SHOOTING GROUND, RATCHABURI, THAILAND

Early January saw Robert Hall, Caesar Torre and myself along with support crew (Debs) travel to Bangkok, Thailand to attend the Asian Sporting & Compak Championships held at Photharam Shooting Range.

We flew in a few days early to relax and acclimatise to the weather in Bangkok with some intense shopping being had in the process! The Thai association made it very easy to visit by assisting with all permits in and out of Thailand. We were greeted at the airport on arrival and our guns taken to the range armoury, then met upon our flight out as well. This made it very easy to travel around Bangkok and sight see without having to worry about our guns.

There isn't much use for a hire car in Bangkok as taxis are cheap in the city. A 15-minute ride costs about three dollars and the traffic is horrendous anyway, however the massages and beer more than make up for it!



After being rested up and ready to compete we travelled to Ratchaburi. It's about a 2hr drive west from Bangkok, so we went back to the airport to hire a car. Anyone who's been in a car with me would know my driving style suits Thailand traffic perfectly, so with the help of an iPhone and the odd "SLOW DOWN!" from the back seat, we made it out to the range without any issues at all. You must watch out for the monkeys that live in the jungle at the range. They often cross the road to feed on the sugar cane and have no fear of vehicles.

The range itself is set on private land which sees flat ground with some thick Thai jungle, large hills and sugar cane fields utilised very well. (There is a YouTube video on Facebook with some highlights of the shoot) Competitors from twenty-one nations across all Asia, Europe,

the USA and New Zealand were in attendance along with four Aussies. (Nigel Montgomery flew in from Singapore.) The opening ceremony was held at the beautiful Nevela Hotel in their garden and a fabulous banquet was offered after a warm welcome by the host county with a traditional Thai dancing display.

With the shooting starting on the Thursday for the Sporting competition, the targets were impressive with plenty of variety. Jamie Peckham from Promatic was engaged to set the targets for both the Sporting and Compak and he certainly did an amazing job. The change of speed was used to good effect as was the use of angle. We had targets set from 15m all the way out to 45m. These targets were as good as any I've shot before and you had to be on the ball to shoot good scores. FITASC disciplines are relatively new in Asia, and there is an effort being made to encourage as many people to participate as possible, however there were no 'free' targets and it was a challenging, very enjoyable event. Four new style layouts were set and revised for the second day of competition with the difficulty being ramped up a little for day two. Rob shot very well to finish second overall on 191 from Polish shooter Remi Wlodarczyk 193, and New Zealand's Adam Green in third on 187.

The Compak competition started Saturday morning across eight layouts, with four being shot each day with refs and staff being swapped over for day two. Something many of us might not be aware of is, that in Compak it is legal to shoot the competition targets in practise, as long as the menus are changed for the competition. Being my first international Compak event, I wasn't sure what to expect. Targets were set strictly to Compak rules, and all had break zones inside the 25m rectangle. I'd say the furthest target would have been 30m, yet therein lies the difficulty of Compak. To be competitive, you have to just about hit them all! The winning score of 195/200 was shot by Konstantin Lelikov of Russia, with Remi on 194 and Danish Junior Emil Korsgaard shooting off for bronze with Rob Hall on 192. They put on a great show both shooting 23/25 in the shoot off, with Rob finally succumbing 9-10 in sudden death. Myself and Adam completed the top six with 191 and 190 respectively. It was an immensely enjoyable competition, and a discipline I would love to see more of at home. Overall, I think the Australians performed very well considering the standard of competition.

For those of you considering coming next year, I would say definitely do it! The Thai people are great, the food is amazing and there will be a new range available for the Sporting competition 6kms down the road, which looks superb! Overall it was a truly wonderful experience and if like me, you have never visited Asia before, you should seriously consider it! Hopefully more Australian's will make the trip next year for this great event!











► AP'S TOP TIPS:

- Getting around in Bangkok is easy either via taxi or Tuk Tuk (Tuk
 Tuks are a little more expensive) with plenty of sight seeing and
 shopping to be done. The same can not be said for Ratchaburi –
 Catch up with Caesar if you would like to know more about how
 to travel like a local in a regional area.
- Weather Yes, it was hot and humid the whole time, huge eskys
 with bottled water were made available throughout the entire
 week and the range staff did a great job at trying to keep everyone
 as cool as possible. Seeing that some competitors had come from
 -25oC it wasn't really as tough on the Aussies as it was on them
 and there is plenty of cold beer available at the end of each day!
- Ammunition is purchased at the range with a wide array of different brands ranging from \$230AUD to \$260AUD per flat. Yes it is expensive, however ammunition in Thailand is subject to around 40% tax! When you are working out those sums keep in mind that in Ratchaburi our hotel room cost \$25AUD/night for two of us and an expensive room will set you back \$50AUD. Breakfast for three of us was \$4 and dinner for our group topped out at \$70AUD one night. Lunch at the range would cost about \$3 and

local beers were \$2.50AUD. Swings and roundabouts, and overall a cheap trip if you can stay away from the markets and shopping centres in Bangkok (hey Deb!) Also you are able to claim the 7% VAT back on the ammunition at the airport as you are leaving, if you have a receipt, so it's not as bad as it first seems (I just need to remember to get the receipt next time!)

One of the biggest challenges at the moment for all SCA member clubs, is the management and mitigation of Environmental issues & Risk at our shooting ranges. "What is all this Environmental tosh to do with me?" Well as we know the world is a continuous place of flux, the Environment is in the news from Climate change down to plastic bags & everything else we do. The shooting community have remained outside of this bubble for a while just waiting for time to catch up with us. Well it has and unfortunately it will now require us to become involved. The next process cannot be taken care of at a State or National Level & will require Clubs to become proactive in this next stage. How do we handle this you ask at our Clubs without it consuming the working committees totally in our Voluntary roles, we are already overloaded doing what we are doing already?

Well it is not all doom & gloom. Over the past year SCA has been busy behind the scenes preparing & implementing a process to help you at your Club contain any fallout with this issue & do not be under any illusion, if ignored, this has the potential to close down shooting ranges if you do not take action.

Environmental management at shooting ranges is a topical issue that needs to be addressed by shooting clubs and organisations. Legal, regulatory and public concerns about environmental issues at outdoor shooting ranges are being raised more frequently, and this trend will likely continue. It is in the best interest of our National, State and Local entities to acknowledge the concerns about possible environmental issues at our ranges. In 2017, the Sporting Clays Australia (SCA) Executive Team conducted a workshop to discuss the environmental issues associated with clay shooting ranges. Discussed were the potential environmental risks, the role of environmental management and why it is required, and the need for environmental stewardship. SCA has now taken the initiative to develop National Environmental Management Guidelines for Sporting Clay Shooting Ranges that will help SCA's member clubs in adopting and practicing the principles of Environmental Stewardship at their facilities. Environmental stewardship refers to responsible use and protection of the natural environment through conservation and sustainable practices.

SCA's strategy reflects its commitment to protecting the environment, the wider community and the best interests of our Clubs. The Guidelines are intended to provide member clubs with relevant information and due processes, to assist the clubs in assessing and understanding their environmental risks. This is the first step in the risk management process and helps in defining the potential risks of the member clubs, selecting applicable and feasible Best Management Practices (BPMs), and implementing Environmental Management Plans (EMPs). Special attention is given to the management of site contamination originating from shooting activities, as this is considered one of the main risks for clubs. It is in the best interest of SCA member clubs to recognise the growing legal, regulatory and public concern about how its activities may affect the environment.

Clubs should neither ignore nor be frightened by the growing attention to these issues as they can easily be identified and addressed through a well-established risk assessment process. Proactively addressing these concerns provides an opportunity for Clubs to demonstrate their commitment to Environmental Stewardship and management of their environmental and financial liabilities.

OBJECTIVES

The objectives of the SCA guidelines are to:

- Provide a nationally consistent, transparent, predictable and streamlined guide to environmental risk management at sporting clays shooting ranges
- Achieve better protection of the environment through improved management of the environmental risks posed by sporting clays shooting activities

Committed to developing the discipline of sporting clays across Australia

- Provide the community with greater confidence that potentially harmful or high-risk environmental pollutants are subject to appropriate and consistent environmental measures
- Reduce regulatory burden by making it simpler and more costeffective for SCA member clubs to fulfil their obligations for managing the environmental risks



 Implement an outcomes-based risk management approach to encourage continued innovation and efficiency in environmental protection.

The SCA guidance document is organised sequentially to address the different steps in developing and implementing EMPs, as follows:

- Introduction to the guidance documents
- Framework Explanation of the Environmental Stewardship and Risk Management framework of the guidance document
- Risk Management Principles Description of the Risk Management principles and how they apply to SCA member clubs
- Potential environmental issues at ranges Description of potential environmental issues at SCA ranges, with focus on site contamination issues.
- Environmental Site Assessments Description of the site contamination assessment process, and how it applies to SCA member clubs

- Identifying Best Management Practices Guidance on available and feasible Best Management Practices that can be adopted by clubs
- Environmental Management Plans Guidance on the development of Environmental Management Plans for clubs

There are different types of risk for a person, corporation or recreational club, including but not limited to (Department of Foreign Affairs and Trade, Australian Government, September 2016):

- Workplace health and safety risks
- Environmental risks
- Natural environment risks
- · Community risks
- Regulatory risks
- Financial risks
- · Reputational risks
- · Closure and post-closure (legacy) risks.

The SCA guidance document relates only to environmental risk issues at SCA Sporting Clay Shooting ranges.



The framework of the SCA guidance document is based on SCA member clubs adopting the principles of "Environmental Stewardship" as they relate and apply to the Sporting Clay shooting ranges.

Environmental Stewardship refers to responsible use and protection of the natural environment through conservation and sustainable practices.

The overarching Environmental Stewardship Principles include:

- Minimising potential impacts on human health and the environment
- Protecting groundwater, surface water, wetlands, fauna, flora, biodiversity and ecosystems

 preventing subsurface soil contamination
- Managing potential impacts on the community. It is important to note that adopting these principles are a voluntary process. However, these principles do provide a framework within which member clubs can fulfil their environmental duty of care and, through a structured process, assess environmental risks in a factual and evidence-based manner. However, shooting clubs and its members have a legal duty to meet general environmental protection obligations that apply to all businesses and citizens in Australia.

To decide how to meet your general environmental duty, you need to think about the:

 Nature of the harm or potential harm - for example, how severe is the potential environmental harm?







- Sensitivity of the environment you are operating in for example, are you operating near a protected area, waterway or sensitive habitat?
- Current state of technical knowledge for the activity for example, what is the current best practice for the activity?
- Likelihood of possible measures being successful for example, how likely are different measures to successfully prevent or minimise environmental harm?
- Financial implications of taking different measures for example, will taking certain prevention measures rather than others mean your activity is not commercially viable? The efforts require in adopting and more specifically in implementing and standing by the Environmental Stewardship principles should not be underestimated. It requires an ongoing commitment from the club's management team and from club members. This commitment should be publicly expressed through a club's Environmental Management Policy.

In general terms, the implementation of Environmental Stewardship Principles by SCA member clubs would involve the following:

- Formal adoption of an Environmental Management Policy.
- Completion of an Environmental Risk Assessment, in accordance with the "AS/NZS ISO 31000:2009: Risk management – Principles and guidelines standards framework" guideline.
- Completion of a Site Contamination Assessment, in accordance with the ASC NEPM.
- Implementation of environmental management measures (e.g. through EMPs based on BMPs) to minimise environmental harm.
- Ongoing monitoring and review of identified risks and implemented measures. Environmental risk assessment and site contamination assessments can be complex and require specialised knowledge and experience. It is recommended that clubs engage with a suitably qualified environmental or risk management consultant or people who are trained and skilled in the process.

IDENTIFY THE RISK

A clear understanding of risk and its contributing factors is needed to identify and describe risk and analyse its potential impact on the environment, organisation or activity. The aim of the risk identification process is to understand all the key risk events that are relevant to a project, activity or other situational context; define their cause-and-effect relationships; identify the nature and extent of all potential consequences (for example, financial, environmental, social, economic, safety); and understand their likelihood of occurring. All information obtained during the risk identification is used in the subsequent risk analysis and assessment (Department of Foreign Affairs and Trade, Australian Government, September 2016).

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Risk identification involves identifying:

- Potential sources of risk (e.g. contamination form shooting activities, storage of fuel, storage and use of chemicals; noise exposure beyond a club's boundary)
- Areas of impact (e.g. environmental, legislative, corporate reputation)
- Potential transport mechanisms and exposure pathways of the potential risks (e.g. corrosion and leaching of lead into surface water bodies or groundwater)
- Potential environmental receptors (e.g. wetland areas, creeks, fauna/flora, adjacent properties)
- Events (including changes in circumstances) and their causes and consequences. Risk identification should consider several pertinent questions, such as:
- What could happen: what might go wrong, or what might prevent the achievement of the relevant goals? What events or occurrences could threaten the intended outcomes?
- How could it happen: is the risk likely to occur at all or happen again? If so, what could cause the risk event to recur or contribute to it happening again?
- Where/when could it happen: is the risk likely to occur anywhere/ anytime or in any environment/place? Or is it a risk that is dependent on the timing, location, physical area or activity?
- Why might it happen: what factors would need to be present for the risk to happen or occur again? Understanding why a risk might occur or be repeated is important if the risk is to be managed.
- What might be the impact: if the risk were to eventuate, what impact or consequences would or might this have? Will the impact be felt locally? Will the impact affect the standing of the club within the wider community?

There is not getting away from this process. State Governments will be implementing these requirements upon all Gun Clubs very soon if not already, & not just those Clubs associated with SCA. The Good news (If you can consider any good news in this) for our Clubs is that SCA are ahead of the game & we have policies & resources available now to manage the process that is coming. The Environmental Policy has been approved at the last AGM for use by our Member State Associations. We have access to specialists in this field & availability to close out any of the processes required. In saying that, the process for our Clubs will not be a one size fits all, as each of you will have differing requirements depending on how you are situated with ground cover, water run off etc.

To move this forward we neede everyone on board to be proactive & set in place processes & documents that will satisfy the requirements in your State, SCA has sent each of your State bodies an Action Checklist document that will allow you to move this forward as to what is required & to close this out. SCA will provide positive action through your State body by assisting the Clubs, but first your Club will have to complete this document. Do not be concerned that you do not have the documents required as this is expected & we are aware that it will be a given "No" in most cases. We need to know now what is missing at a Club level to prepare your documentation to carry this through.

Once you have returned your form back to your State body it will determine what other assistance SCA will have to provide to allow your Risk management principles to be completed. Do not delay completing the **Action Checklist**. The sooner we have these forms completed, the sooner we can finalise the principles to assist you all & keep our ranges open for Clay Target shooting.

VISITOR FIREARM PERMIT - DO NOT DELAY!!!!!

If you have not made an application yet for your Firearm permit we would urgently advise you not to delay applying for your UK Visitors Firearm License.

This permit will take a minimum of 6 weeks to process & then it will have to be mailed back out to you!!!!!

Make sure you have paid this fee to FITASC when you purchased your Entry into the Competition if you require EJ Churchills to

process your application.

FITASC are helping in this application process with EJ Churchills.

EJ Churchills are not collecting the fee direct, the fee will go via FITASC. EJ Churchills will not process any permit until advised by FITASC that this 40 Euro fee has been received by FITASC.

The UK Visitors firearm license will allow your firearm to clear UK Customs & it also allows you to purchase ammunition while you are in the UK. No License - No Entry into the UK & No Ammunition purchase

RULES CORNER

There has been some confusion about the various rules of FITASC Sporting, FITASC Compak Sporting and English Sporting regarding the way that Doubles are to be shot and scored in each discipline.

FITASC Sporting

Simultaneous or Rafale Double

In any Simultaneous or Rafale Double the targets may be shot in any order. You may shoot both shots at the one target. If both targets are broken by the one shot, either on the first or second shot, the score is "one-one".

Double on Report

If a shooter misses the first target and fires the second shot at the first target and breaks it, the score is recorded as "one-lost". If both targets are broken by the second shot the score is recorded as "one-one".

NOTE: On a Repeat Double where the score on the first target has been noted and a new Double is thrown to establish the result of the second shot, the shooter must make a reasonable attempt to place the first shot in a similar position as they shot it in the original double.

FITASC Compak Sporting

In Compak Sporting the scoring of Doubles is different than that for FITASC Sporting.

Rule 2.5.3 In any Double, both targets must be shot at. It is prohibited to fire two shots at the one target of any Double.

Simultaneous Double

The targets may be shot in any order. If both targets are broken in one shot, the Double is declared as "no-targets" with no score established. The Double must be repeated for a result on both targets.

Explanation: In Compak Sporting you must fire a shot at every target; double barrelling of the one target on any Double is prohibited.

English Sporting

Single targets are allowed to be thrown as double barrel targets.

In Doubles, the shooter may fire both shots at the one target as in FITASC Sporting. Doubles rules for scoring are the same as FITASC Sporting.

A maximum of 10 targets can be thrown from the one shooting stand.

Report Doubles

Rule 24.22 When re-shooting a Report Double for a result on the second target, the competitor must make a reasonable attempt to break the first target before attempting to shoot and break the second target.

Rule 24.23 Referees must ensure that competitors adhere strictly to rule 24.22. If a violation of the rule takes place, the Referee shall ask the competitor to repeat the Double (1st target score established). If the competitor violates rule 24.22 on three occasions, then at the third occasion the second target of the Double will be declared "lost".

New Rule

2019 Update for all Competitions:

Menu Boards must now include lisitng of Exotic Targets:

Rabbit, Battue, 90mm, 70mm, 60mm

A - D/B - Battue

B - D/B

C - D/B - 90mm

With our sponsors, Outdoor Sporting Agency, providing some really high quality prizes, including range bags and camouflaged utility belts, people walked away that day feeling they had a little bit of extra kit ready for the duck season.


the highest level. Without them he could not do what he does.


