2019 FITASC GRAND PRIX GEELONG







The 2019 FITASC Grand Prix held at the Geelong Range was not one of our best efforts.

As I do not duck criticism when things do not turn out as planned, I assume full responsibility for the problems we had with targets being wind effected etc.

A lot of work went into it by a number of people and what looked good on the Friday with a light Northerly wind blowing, turned nasty on the Saturday when the wind changed to the South and only got worse over the weekend as the wind increased and kept changing directions.

As it was a International event and one on which our National Team is finalized it was set to be a challenge for the shooters.

With the change of the wind on a Range that is totally exposed it was too difficult and for many not enjoyable (it is known as pleurisy plains), especially the tower targets and the incomers that with the wind on their back fell way short of from where they were set.

I was disappointed and it was not our intended outcome but despite all this there were some fantastic scores shot.

There were 8 Ranges set to a similar format to what is shot at the Nationals, a total of 60 traps were used to give great variety. The ranges were built with four sets of two ranges set close together so as the competitors shot 50 targets in a run. This worked well and as the competitors could drive to each Range, the provision of bus transport was not required.

We were well served by Sponsors with Clay and Hunt (platinum sponsors for this event) providing a \$6,000 Zoli under & over Shotgun for the overall winner.

Other Sponsors for this event, Outdoor Sporting Agencies - Gold, Winchester Australia – Silver Outdoor, Trading Company - Bronze. Together they provided a very impressive trophy table and our thanks go to them all.

Trophy presentations where conducted inside the club house due to the inclement weather and we never got to use the prepared dais to unfurl the flags for the winners and placegetters.

There were two shoot-offs, Scratch Chris Brown and Cameron Kivinen, Juniors

Mathew Wilesmith and Mark DuRose.

They were held over at the scaffold, with the wind blowing we shot it from off the ground to the "Old Style FITASC" format, Chris and Cameron had a great battle with Cameron taking the Bronze Medal in front of Chris, in the Juniors it looked all over for Mathew even though he was shooting brilliantly Mark was on a higher level again and did not look like missing, Mathew hung in and on the last stand Mark 22/25 faltered and let Mathew in 23/25 to again win the Gold Medal.

SCA SPORTING NATIONALS

HEAD TO THE NSW HIGH COUNTRY IN OCTOBER 2019



Cooma Sporting Clays is excited about being given the opportunity to host the 2019 Sporting Clays Nationals. We are working hard to produce the top-level event that is expected of the SCA Nationals. It has been 21 years since Cooma held the 1998 Australian Sporting Clays Championships which incorporated the inaugural English Sporting Championship. This was the first year that the event was held over 3 days. (South Australia were to hold the 1997 Nationals and the first English Sporting Championships, unfortunately torrential rain washed out the event without a shot being fired.)

Cooma Sporting Clays range is based centrally in the Monaro, Snowy mountains region of NSW. The club's grounds boast a wide variety of terrain that affords itself to high quality shooting with a broad array of targets on any given range, in addition CSC with the generosity of neighbouring landholders have been able to gain approval to offer even more variety. Five of the eight competition ranges will be held on new country offering different terrain which will allow the range setters a broader canvas to set this year's event. The club will also be operating two practice ranges.

Sporting Clays Australia is looking forward to a good presence with their Sponsors in 2019. Perazzi, Berretta, Outdoor Trading Company, Top Shot Industries and others will all be in attendance with trade stores to add to the atmosphere.

Famous as a snow holiday destination, the Snowy Mountains attract over 700,000 visitors per year with its stunning scenery, unique history and variety of attractions. With European settlement, Cattle country, the man from Snowy River and now the home of Kosciuszko National Park and numerous Ski Resorts to name a few.

Its beauty and stark contrasts span its length and breadth. There is a real passion for this amazing part of the country, with its distinct seasons of fresh summer air and winter snow across an expansive mountain landscape. The area is steeped in history with the traditional land holders using the mountains as a meeting ground and the destination for the summer "Bogong Moth" expeditions.

In our first big event for 2019 we hosted the English Sporting Nationals, at Laang SSAA Warrnambool on May 4th & 5th. This was our first time hosting the English Sporting Nationals, and was a challenge for our target setters with everything set up as either report pairs or sim pairs. Looking at the scores I think we got the level of difficulty spot on!

With the Oceania Championships being held in Brisbane only 2 weeks prior plus School and Easter Holidays, numbers were down although everyone in attendance had a great weekend away shooting.

Saturday greeted us with some light showers, otherwise weather was ideal with limited wind to affect targets and Sunday's weather was

With some very tricky targets on display, the competition was tight from the outset. Even the best couldn't afford to take it easy on any target as you only had one shot at each. This format of shooting is great for improving your concentration and maximising each shot.

Chris Brown and Nick Guerra once again led from the front and after 200 targets they could not be separated on 187/200. This left 7 shooters to head into the 'Super Shoot Off' consisting of 24 targets over 3 stands with scores to be carried over to final result.

Chris was first shooter to start in the shoot off and on the first stand he hit 6/8 targets with Nick hitting 5/8 giving Chris the lead.

From here on in Chris hit his remaining 16 straight giving him the win by 4 targets. Final scores Chris 209 Nick 205.

Luke Willemsen also put on an impressive performance shooting 21/24 to put him equal 3rd with Frank Cefai; resulting in sudden death shoot off. Luke shooting 4/4 to Frank's 3/4.

A huge thank you to all committee members who helped out leading up to the event and throughout the competition to ensure everything was presented as it should be. Those involved in the setting up and running of these events appreciate the work that goes in to ensure everyone has a great event.

RULES CORNER

FITASC CATEGORIES AND RESPONSIBILITIES FOR TEAM QUALIFIERS

With the various age categories in FITASC there can be confusion when a competitor moves from one Category to another.

- Juniors upgrade to Man Category in the year of their 21st birthday
- Competitors become Seniors in the year of their 56th birthday
- · Competitors become Veterans in the year of their 66th birthday
- Competitors become Masters in the year of their 73rd birthday

For competitors who are seeking to qualify for Australian Team Selection, they must notify their State Target Director when they are moving from one category to another, this is to make sure that they are selected in the correct category. This is a common occurrence as the National Training Squad Lists are finalised in the year prior to the next Oceania and World Championships for which they are seeking Team Selection.

The FITASC Rules state that if for instance a competitor who is by age a Master, they can be chosen in a National Veteran Team but by doing so must relinquish their Individual Masters Category and compete individually as a Veteran.

FITASC OCEANIA CHAMPIONSHIP 2019

BRISBANE SPORTING CLAYS





It has been 18 years since the last Oceania Championships in 2001 were held at Brisbane Sporting Clays. The Club has seen many improvements over this period that allowed them to confidently put their hands up for another FITASC Oceania event in the area of trap purchases, ground preparations & amenities.

The Club members elected a new Committee last year with John English taking on the role of President. The dedicated Committee and members had spent many tireless months preparing for this international FITASC event and nothing was missed.

This Oceania event at Brisbane Sporting Clays was not going to disappoint with anyone that made the trip up to Queensland for Easter. The expectations from the Sporting Clay Australia members & international visitors attending the event at Brisbane Sporting Clays always knew they were going to produce the goods; everything was thought of and catered for.

The only area that could not be controlled was the weather. The black clouds rolled in but fortunately the weather generally behaved itself apart for a few heavy showers on the first day of Competition. Fortunately, these showers only lasted a few minutes and cleared away for good shooting conditions & with the cloud cover that partially remained, it produced civilised shooting conditions for everyone.

Eight separate shooting grounds with World Class targets had been set up by the new BSC Target Director – Jason Pole (and his small crew). There was a great variety of trajectories, angles and speed to keep the entertainment value up & also with this mix of targets it kept the members moving through the stations without any hold ups. The top four grounds up the hill had a bus shuttle servicing to assist the competitors to arrive at the start points of each ground feeling fit and able.

The traps were set up well with very few breakages (apart from one Rabbit trap that required a little TLC after the timing went out on the first day). The targets performed to expectations, with the underpainted clays also providing another angle to the itinerary of the target setters. The background at BSC is difficult with the bush and trees. The club has been trailing the new under-painted options that have been in the Australian market for a while which allowed the club to throw underbelly clays at low level and still have them visible. Some SCA members have seen the orange under-painted, but no one outside of Brisbane had seen the new neon Yellow under-painted.

The first day's competition started well and this theme continued throughout the Competition with grounds running to time and the day's Competition completing on schedule allow competitors time to catch up at the end of the day in the Clubhouse to catch up with old & new friends over some refreshments. A packed Clubhouse at the

end of the day's shooting is always a good sign people are enjoying themselves.

The scoring Computer programme had a small glitch that was causing a problem when the admin team tried to print out the next two days start rotation for the squads. These gremlins are not always easy to resolve, but Ashley and his team persevered and got on top of the problem by the end of the first day. Other than this small issue the operation ran perfectly.

In the other important area at any event...... Food. The Club under head Chef Charmaine's guidance produce great product, that was also well priced. As always if the food is good quality and priced correctly is does not hang around long. Each day the Club put on a different menu outside of the usual BBQ Burgers, Sausages and the options on sale catered for all tastes, no one was left out. Well done to the BSC Chefs in keeping the hordes fed & hydrated.

When the targets and menus were being set and fine tuned the O/A High Gun score of 192/200 was the total score the technical committee had in mind and this proved to be on the money. The idea behind this thinking is to do with the majority of the Competitors who make up an event. Experience has taught us that if you keep the expectations of the winning score around this area, the experience is enjoyed by all levels of competitors attending. Our sport has expense associated with & people need to feel they have received value for the Dollars they spend. When you attend a World Title FITASC Sporting event the O/A High Gun score is expected to be around 192/200 to 194/200. If you do not take this into consideration and the winning O/A High Gun score is below 190/200 experience shows the majority of our members attending will not be enjoying the competition and they will have second thoughts about returning to another. If our sport is to grow, we have to consider all levels of ability. The Competition has to be set with enough difficulty to make the top end shooters work for their targets but also allow the majority to also achieve their level. A fine line to get this right, but it has to be a priority of any competition.

After the final Clay had been broken, the scores were tallied up & unusually there were very few shoot offs to be done.

B Grade for Third position had a three-way affair with - Nicholas Marlier (163/200 + 11) taking out the third position – with Marion Roumange (163/200 + 10) – Joseph Clifford (163/200 + 10) just missing out. The graded shoot off was over 12 targets.

The other shoot off was for third & fourth in the O/A Scratch. This was between Blake Nankervis (190/200 + 24) and Cameron Kivenen (190/200 +23) This shoot off was over 25 targets. These two men put on a great show for the crowd that had gathered to watch. It went down to the last stand before the deadlock was broken. Well done Gentlemen & fine display of your skills.

HUNTING AND HABITAT UPDATE

MAY 2019

First & foremost my apologies for omitting details of the Tasmanian game bird and animal season information in the last edition.

By the time you receive this edition duck seasons will have finished except for the quail season in S.A which concludes 31st August, hope many members had a successful season.

While the 2019 duck seasons are behind us there are plenty of other hunting opportunities available.

VICTORIA – Game birds: pheasants, partridges, European quail, California quail. Deer: Red, Sambar(until 30th Nov), Fallow, Chital & Rusa

 $\mbox{N.S.W}$ – great opportunities exist for hunting on Public land, see DPI NSW website for details.

TASMANIA - The Wallaby season continues until 23rd Feb 2020.

In **WA** we have been very active in Rainbow Lorikeet control with a total of 4671 birds destroyed this fruit growing season in vineyards in the Swan valley and hills orchards.

We have also responded to requests from Local Govt. for help in Corella control which has been much appreciated by residents.

Planned donkey control trips in station country have had to be postponed to later in the year due to much needed rain arriving.

FOX DRIVES

LOWER SOUTH EAST OF SA

MAY 2019

A local group of fox hunters has spent last couple of months doing fox drives on various properties in Lower South East of SA. Ages vary from as young as 5 years up to 65 years of age, male & female. Hunters using dogs, firearms and motor bikes to push foxes out of tree plantations to hunters sitting and waiting to shoot any suspect foxes exiting the scrub in a hurry.

The highest tally of foxes shot in one day has been 64. The effort by the group of hunters is a fantastic help for farmers who are lambing and calving, protecting valuable stock from foxes.











NSW - WILD DEER HUNTING

NSW hunters are still enjoying some better than average access and relaxed restrictions thanks to NSW DPI, Department of primary Industries.

To minimise the impacts of abundant wild deer herds across the State, some of the deer hunting regulations have been suspended. The current suspension applies across all of NSW for a period of three years.

Wild deer were identified as a priority species in the <u>11 Local Land Services Regional Strategic Pest Animal Management Plans.</u> Suspending the normal rules for deer hunting allows more options to control and minimise their impacts on landholders, the environment and communities.

Licensed, reputable hunters are <u>invited to add their details to the Deer Assistance Hunter Register</u> so landholders may contact them for help managing the impacts of wild deer.

DPI have also been very proactive in the southern parts of the state having held public meetings and forums in an effort to share information on their efforts in fallow deer control. Meetings have been well attended on the most part with community interest high on sustainable utilization of the resource rather than eradication and disposal of the carcase. DPI are very keen to involve registered hunting organizations (RHO's) at the local level to help with control measures. If you belong to a club that is an RHO and would like to be involved, please contact Your local DPI office to find further info.

LOXTON FIELD & GAME - NOORA DUCK HUNTING

Loxton Field & Game have conducted 2 shoots at Noora Evaporation Basin up until now, the first hunt was conducted on Saturday 13th April and the second was Sunday 26th May.

So far to date we have struggled to have enough water in the basin to enable suitable hunting area for hunters to conduct a successful harvest of waterfowl and we have had to cancel hunting weekends due to low water and the lack of waterfowl. We (Loxton F&G) have no control over the volumes of saline water that is transferred to the site,



this is managed by SA Water SIS (Salt Interception Scheme) personnel in conjunction with DEW (Department of Environment and Water) and MDBA (Murray-Darling Basin Authority).

Before the first shots were fired some local members were busy building new duck blinds in a few areas, this will help to try and get a few more areas covered and allow for a few extra hunters when we have our bigger shoots during the season.

The first hunt on the 13th April where we had 10 hunters saw a total of 35 Grey Teal taken. Water levels were considerably lower which didn't deter the keenness of our local members who were eagerly waiting for the camp out, cook up and a few frothies around the campfire. As predicted there wasn't that many birds taken but it was a great weekend and catch up with friends.

The second hunt was conducted on Sunday the 26th May. On the Saturday evening we had good numbers of campers staying the night, we had one member cook up a Red Deer shoulder in a Webber Q for the campers that were present. It was a beautiful cooked meal washed down with a Red Wine and more. This hunt was conducted on the Sunday morning which was due to the clash of a popular clay target event that was held at a neighbouring club on the Saturday. On the Sunday morning we had 11 keen duck hunters in attendance, water



levels were considerably higher than the previous shoot this time and we had large numbers of Grey Teal that were spread out the back of basin number 2 (southern basin). There was also good numbers of Pink Eared duck as well and most hunters shot their bag of 8 ducks all being Grey Teal. All campers had a memorable weekend and we are looking forward to the next shoot which is our annual 2 day "shoot, roast & raffle" weekend.

Some other Noora updates; our new camp shelter is fully completed giving campers a large under cover area for weather protection and camping. We also were given permission to extend our camp site which is now also completed and fully fenced. In addition, we have also been successful and received an NRM Volunteer Small Grant to the value of \$1,000. The money has been used to purchase a spotting scope for waterfowl monitoring and surveying and also to purchase some trees to be planted around the Noora campsite perimeter fence. DEW recently coffer dammed the water regulator on number 1 basin (northern basin) to carry out modifications to improve the regulator and to construct a fish ladder. These works will take only one week to be completed as the SIS system will not be shut down to complete regulator upgrades, this will then allow water to flow back into the southern basin.

INSURANCE REGISTRATION DETAILS FOR HUNTING ACTIVITIES

The process for hunting as an Individual outside of registered events will require the following to be observed to provide you with Third Party Liability Insurance cover on the day of your hunt.

Any member Hunting outside of Club registered activities will be required to register their Hunting activity via Email or SMS informing the post address of their Name(s) – Area they are going to and duration of the activity. This registration can be made either by Computer or Mobile phone. The message will be received at the designated address for the registration process and a copy saved on your own device. This registration can be made at any time prior to you setting foot on the property.

Please contact your State Body or Club Officials for the contact number required.

This is a simple affair. By registering your hunt to the contact details supplied by your Club or State Association there will be a record on your device (Computer or phone) and at the registration device for the Club or State. You will have proof of the message being sent on your device. This will be sufficient to cover your Insurance requirements and shows that care has been taken by you to record your hunt for Insurance purposes. All communication records with this process will be dated and cannot be refuted.

There is a very good reason for this process and the benefits to our members are obvious.

When our members sign on at a shooting ground this process automatically registers you for insurance cover. In signing the range attendance book for the day, you have proof that you were there at the shooting range on a specific day. This confirms you were there on this day, should you be unfortunate in having an accident.

When a Club or State organises a Hunting event, a sign on process is followed & proof exists that you have been in attendance on that day. You are covered for Insurance. The old ways are changing and we have to change as well. **Unfortunately for us the system we had previously has been tested** and consequently required a rethink in our processes to show proof that members were at a specific area on a specific day.

This lack of accountability is a concern to the Insurance provider who is expected to provide the necessary cover. Previously there has been no official way of registering your activity and no proof to accompany a claim being made. There is no record that a person was actually out hunting on a particular day. In the case of an accident we would not be able to provide the necessary proof that our member was out hunting on that day. This is exposing our members out hunting on their own to a grey area of accountability outside of the Club activities. We have a Duty of Care to our members to provide a system that addresses this concern.

The simplest and easiest way to registered proof, is to register this electronically, which also removes the inconvenient phone calls to your already overworked Executives. Most members have access to a computer (not all I know) and everyone seems to have a mobile phone these days. This simple process will register your activity and give you peace of mind recording your hunting trip for the insurance provision.

This is the Hunting equivalent to a Range Register at the shooting range.

There are benefits to be made from this process for both the members and Club/State.

- Greater contact between the two parties. Some hunters do not visit their club or have any other contact with them throughout their membership.
- The Club or State has the ability to offer these members important Email contact, informing members of any changes to seasons or developments in other areas of hunting.
- Information available to the Hunting & Habitat Committee on actual hunting days carried out. This would benefit the H&H Committee with statistics when they talk to the Government bodies.

SOUTH AUSTRALIAN OLD STYLE SPORTING CHAMPIONSHIPSHELD AT ROCKY GULLY

MAY 2019

Rocky Gully Sporting Clays was the host for this year's Outdoor Trading Company South Australian Old Style Sporting State Championship, an event that is always looked forward to from many shooters both in SA and interstate. Old Style Sporting isn't something that many get a chance to shoot very often, so there is always a great deal of interest and this year was no exception. This event was once again sponsored by Outdoor trading company providing a generous prize pool of GB shot shells, we thank them for their ongoing support of Rocky Gully

This year the format was changed to a one day shoot over 4 old style courses for 100 targets total. Rocky Gully felt that this format was easier for our crew to organise and set up, however, running less courses did mean that places would be tighter than previous years. Not surprisingly, the event filled up with a week still to go and there was a list of people on the waiting list in case anyone dropped out. If you're reading this and you are keen to be a part of next year's event, keep this in mind and send your nominations in early to avoid disappointment. We'd love to take everyone, but old style is that kind of event that has a firm cap for numbers.

The courses were layed out, with the help of some of experienced members who haven't tilted their hand at course setting for a while and were itching to have a go again. They definitely did an excellent job, with plenty of variation on targets moving around as well as back to have pads with some distance on them. The pads on courses were also placed up and down slopes or on a walk up to play with height and overhead targets quickly became ones under your eye level, catching a few people off guard. Ground 4 proved to be the most difficult course with very technical targets, so many shooters were missing target E off pad 3 and 4 and it was only a 20 metre crosser or a 15 meter driven target you had to shoot down from the platform.

Conditions all week were fine, but the predicted weather change did come in early



and it was raining before noon. Black clouds passed across the grounds all day, sometime drizzling, other times dumping rain in bursts but some waves did escape the elements and stayed dry. You were the lucky ones! Moreover the clouds, being thick and very black, were clouding the sun in the afternoon, making shooting conditions very gloomy due to low light. It tested us all, but that's what shooting is all about and sometimes you have to persevere through tough conditions and everybody did just that with pretty good spirits.

The only thing that marred the otherwise excellent event was that the first wave got started shooting late, and thus compacting every wave behind and dragging the day behind schedule from the start. We love to see new shooters (or shooters who have only shot club shoots in the past) get involved into bigger state level shoots, but it is an important lesson to those new shooters that the time posted for your squad to shoot is the time you need to be pulling the trigger on your pad, not the time you decide to drive into the car park. It's a reminder to get to the ground nice and early in order to get to some more remote courses with plenty of time up your sleeve. Adding to the time drag was that some shooters were clearly taking longer than the allotted 15 seconds between shots. It doesn't sound like much, but turning that





15 seconds into 20 or 30 translates into many additional minutes per stand, so by the end of the day this alone added over an hour onto our expected finish time.

By the time the final wave shot, it was already very dark from the black clouds overhead. While my squad finished at 4.45pm (and you would have sworn it was an hour later, it was that dark), one squad that followed a particularly slow group was forced to finish when the light was so poor as to be completely unsuitable for shooting. On behalf of the club, I apologise to that squad as it is completely unacceptable and something you don't expect or deserve. It's a lesson hard learned. Next year we will ask our referees to enforce the 15 second rule and being ready to shoot on time at your designated course at the listed start time. This is something that will be strictly adhered to at future events. If you get warned by your referee, take it with good grace as your actions impact all shooters at the event and not just yourself.

Some very good scores were achieved across all of the grades, especially considering the at times very wet and windy conditions.

Congratulations to Alex Button on taking out high gun for the event and the \$500.00 cash prize with a very solid 88 - Well done!

The South Australian Field & Game Association's promotional video was a concept born at a State Council meeting where a strategy into growth of membership was being considered. A budget of \$1000 was approved for the project and a videographer was found in the shape of Mitch Devlin. Mitch makes high quality videos of Sprintcar racing and having seen a promotional video of a speedway driver on Facebook that he had produced, an approach was made. He was keen to try something different and came along to a couple of shoots with his camera gear and drone. The footage he captured with veterans, sub juniors, Ladies, families and the like really emphasises how inclusive this sport is.

After one week the video reached over 16 thousand with nearly 100 shares and positive feedback in the near 100 comments and of course close to 400 likes.

The SAFGA Facebook page picked up 150 new followers in the first week. The original intention of the video was to enable individual SA branch Facebook pages to be able to use the video as a promotional tool specifically with paid advertisements targeting particular demographic groups in respective areas. With Facebook having tightened up its attitude to shooting sports it remains to be seen how viable this option will be down the track. Wendel Lichfield did a good job with the narration and the project came in under budget at \$800, with the feedback thus far would appear to make it a worthwhile project. The proof of the pudding will be in a year or so with the measure of any growth in membership and participation. The SAFGA state council have also approved a promotional Hunting video, this will need to be edited and handled with due care and Consideration.



RANGE EQUIPMENT UPDATE




