Report on the Audit of the Financial Report

Opinion


The plan photo indicates stand centre positions across the skeet layout.

The 'centre station set out point' starts the process with Shooting position 3 as the marking point of the Universal skeet stand positions. This is placed on position 4 of the traditional skeet layout.

This is a new process being developed and stand spacings are still being worked on. Although the plan indicates 9.55mtr centres, the other option is 8.55mtr centres.

It is suggested that members trial both options for the shooting positions and advise us which appears more suitable.

2019 SCA SPORTING NATIONAL CHAMPIONSHIP

COOMA, NSW





At 1250 metres above sea level Cooma Sporting Clays rightly boasts to be Australia's highest gun club and throw clays with altitude! In November, 320 sporting clay shooters from all across the country ascended upon the Alpine district of New South Wales to participate in the 43rd Sporting Clays Australia national championships. There is a huge amount of work involved in setting up to host a national event and Cooma's small band of volunteers were challenged in the preceding week with high winds and snow to provide quality targets and determine a champion and grade/category winners worthy of the \$45,000 prize pool on offer.

Of the eight grounds the four on the southern side of the road being the OTC Promatic & GB, the Miroku and Blaser appeared most exposed to the wind howling off the top of the snow-capped Perisher Valley Mountains in the distance. The wind chill factor seemed to be the biggest talking point besides the sight of a giant crane suspending two high traps. On the Club house side the four grounds of Perazzi, Beretta, SH Shooting & Trust Ammunition in the somewhat sheltered trees were still not immune to some clays getting blown out of the traps! National director of target shooting Steve Chilton, and his band of state target co-ordinators worked tirelessly with the Cooma team and were still adjusting targets at 5pm the night before the event. The forecast for the next couple of days was for very high winds up to 70km/h, with Sunday forecast bright and sunny.

Day one started cold with a strong wind from the north west and saw each competitor shoot 75 targets over three layouts. The nationals are squadded randomly unlike the Australian Grand Prix where eligible Australian team members are squadded together, so it is difficult to determine how the competition is shaping up at the end of day one. However, Friday saw some excellent scores from the top competitors. Jeremy Kent, Bart Brighenti, Blake Nankervis, Peter Tobin and Matt Hall all shot a score of 70/75. Chris Brown, Nick Guerra, Adam Du Rose and Mick Keirl were all one back. Seeing these scores come in over different layouts was proof that the target committee had set targets that were fair and shootable in the conditions.

Saturday morning the wind blew harder and the shooting got hotter. On what has become known as "moving day", the second day of the nationals is the day to make a mark on the leader board. Kent and Brighenti continued to push forward and finished the day on 137 with Blake one back on 136. Cameron Kivinen made his move and shot a brilliant 70 to also sit on 137. The buzz around the ground however was 2011 champion Anthony Panetta had shot lights out with 72/75 to sit atop the leader board on 139. The top five positions were separated by 3 targets. The scene was being set for a climatic finish to the most prestigious sporting clays event on the national calendar.

With all to play for, Sunday morning dawned cold, sunny and with virtually no wind the stage was set for a big finish for the country's best sporting shooters. Whether any of the leaders felt nervous or not, they certainly didn't show it. Panetta, Kivinen, Kent and Brighenti all shot 25 straight on their first layout of the day. With 25 targets to shoot, there were six shooters within four targets of each other.

Panetta and Kivinen were both to finish on arguably the toughest layout of the event, number three. Cameron posted an amazing 24/25 where Anthony shot 22, and after 3 days and 200 targets they both finished on 186/200. The shoot wasn't over and the nervous wait begun for them both. Slowly the scores came in, Brown - 185, Kent - 185, Brighenti - 184, Nankervis - 184. Shoot offs for all the major placings in the open category.

The juniors were having a battle of their own with Rhys McGauran and Mark Du Rose tying on 177 with Luke Willemsen in third place. Maria Dunnett took control of the ladies and won her first national championship ahead of Amy Buys and Shannon Palfreeman. Seniors was won by Neil Pert on a very respectable 180/200. Veterans by Malcom Whitehead and masters by Alec Ceccato while Ben Studham dominated the sub juniors.

The shoot off was set on a reconfigured ground 8 in the "Old Style" FITASC format to separate these shooters at the top of their game in a high pressure situation. Jeremy Kent appeared ruthless as he shot a clean 25 to secure third place over Chris Brown who only dropped one target. Also clean was Mark DuRose to claim the Junior National Championship over Rhys McGauran who fought to the end with a solid 24. Kivinen and Panetta were still tied after their 25 targets having both shot 24 when Anthony missed his second to last target. Sudden death was needed to determine a winner in front of the large assembled crowd of spectators. Three targets in and Anthony missed a tough quartering target at range. This was Cameron's chance and he made the most of it by breaking the clay with his second shot at extreme distance to be crowned 2019 national champion. This was Cameron's second national win after taking out the compak nationals earlier this year.

Presentations were conducted at the range in front or a large crowd where the sponsors were all shown the appreciation of the association and the competitors. Congratulations must go out to the organising committee for the hard work not just over the three days but the months leading up to the event. And thank you to all the volunteers who give up their time to make these events happen. Next year's event will be held at Brisbane Sporting Clays who successfully held the 2017 nationals. The SCA board as well as the Brisbane club look forward to welcoming everyone to the national championship in 2020.

On 12 and 13 October the Broken Hill Field and Game Association hosted its premier simulated field clay target shoot for the year, the thirty sixth annual 150 target Silver City Championships. The weather conditions over the weekend were warm and sunny, with a strengthening breeze, but very good for shooting clay targets. Organisers were delighted with an excellent turnout of more than 90 shooters from across New South Wales, Victoria and South Australia, particularly from Sunraysia and the Riverland, who competed for an impressive range of sashes and trophies.

Range marshals Josh, the other Josh, Gerard, Richard, Ashy, Ashden, Clay and Brian worked very hard to set an excellent range layout that provided plenty of variety and interest and stood up very well in the wind. The degree of difficulty of the targets was maybe a smidgin on the friendly side of average which made for very enjoyable shooting. One possible 25/25 was recorded over the course of the event and was shot by Greg McSwain from Sunraysia.

The best overall score for the shoot was an excellent total of 132 recorded by AA Grade shooter Brian McGaffin from the Sunraysia club who won the Silver City Shield High Gun

sash with just a single shot up his sleeve at the finish. Brian shot very consistently over the whole weekend to claim his third Silver City Championship win, and we look forward to seeing him back to defend his title.

The best overall handicap score for the shoot was a remarkable total of 188 shot by Colby Ellis to win the Silver City Championship Handicap High Gun sash. Three generations of the Ellis family have been stalwart members and supporters of our club for forty years and although Colby lives in Adelaide, he is a Broken Hill member and has continued the family tradition in very fine fashion.

All of the first place prizes in AA Grade were shared by the three top shots at the shoot, and all from the Sunraysia club. Ben Garraway shot 131 for first place in the overall 150 target event, Greg McSwain shot 90 for first place in the 100 target event on Saturday, and Brian McGaffin shot 48 on Sunday to add first place in the 50 target handicap event to his High Gun win.

The result in A Grade was very close indeed with only four shots separating the top four shooters at the finish and just two Sunraysia shooters sharing the first place prizes. Leigh Norton sat in fourth place on Saturday afternoon but made a great come back on Sunday for a total score of 127 to snatch first place in the 150 target event by a single shot from Rodney Bath. Rodney shot 87 to win first place in the 100 target event, and Leigh's excellent shooting on Sunday also won him first place in the 50 target handicap event with a score of 53.

Sunraysia shooter Ryan Neyland had a great weekend in Broken Hill taking a clean sweep of all the first place prizes in B Grade. Ryan comfortably won first place in the 150 target event with a great score of 121, shot off for first place in the 100 target event on Saturday and won with a score of 79, and also won first place in the 50 target handicap event with a score of 58.

Broken Hill shooters shared all the first place prizes in C Grade. Adrian Locke shot very well on Saturday for a score of 72 to win the 100 target event by just a single shot. But Bob Tweedie had a day out on Sunday and he caught and passed the leaders and won first place in the 150 target event with a great score of 109. Bob also won first place in the 50 target handicap event with a score of 62.

Loxton shooter Julie Gillespie has been a regular competitor at the Silver City Championships. This year Julie was easily the best of the lady shooters taking a comfortable first place in the 150 target event with a great score of 99, and she also shot well on Sunday to score 57 to win the 50 target handicap event. Samantha Zoch from the Sunraysia club shot an excellent 68 on Saturday to win the 100 target event.

Brian Casey has been one of Broken Hill's more successful shooters for some time with good grade wins at home, and a number of veteran grade prizes at Sunraysia and the Riverland. Brian continued his good form with excellent shooting to win the 150 target event with a great score of 119 and the 100 target event with a score of 79. Peter Ellis, also shooting for Broken Hill, had a good day on Sunday and shot 51 to win the 50 target handicap event.


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BREAKING NEWS FROM THE WEST

WE HAVE A NEW NAME

It sure has been a very positive and productive 2019 year for the State Association here in WA.

Not only have we seen a lot of our younger members step up to learn how to set targets and our State Association took advantage of an opportunity and paid for Mark Marshall from the UK who is a world renowned course setter, whilst he was in Perth, we organised interested members from all clubs to attend a training course and learnt target setting from one of the best and how you can set targets that are fun to shoot and interesting and have your paying customers "the shooters" leave your club having had a great time wanting to come back for more. The camaraderie amongst members is strong in WA at present.

Another challenge for us is meeting the criteria set by our State Department of Sport & Recreation to secure funding, Notably, DSR was supportive for the developing of our Constitution, policies procedures etc and for this to happen the State invested in the services of a consultant to assist us with this process, as it is a lot of admin and legal work for volunteers. Our consultant who is a lawver also had a great understanding of our shooting sport which was valuable. The benefit was the speed and ease to get our new constitution approved, as we now meet all the legal requirements for the Incorporation 2015 legislation Act here in WA. Plus, we now have a very workable constitution operating as a Board structure as an Incorporated Association. A very positive outcome moving into the future.

This year we celebrated 50 years of the foundation of WA Field and Game. It is important to remember our past history and how we got to where we are today. Back on the 27th October 1969 the inaugural meeting was held at the Perth Town Hall where the WA Field and Game Association was born 50 years ago. Mr Ray Motteram OAM was at this meeting and very involved and continued to do so for many years, and he also went on to become the President of Field & Game Federation for 11 years.

As we reflect over the 50 years of our sport, which was in the beginning a Hunting and conversation Association and clay target shooting was just something that was done in the "off season" to keep your shooting skills up in preparation for the annual duck shooting season. The times do change and shooting sporting clays was really becoming popular amongst members. Hence the ongoing debates should we separate the two sports. Whilst, there are members that do not want to be personally involved with culls these people are mindful and respect the importance of H&H. It was made perfectly

clear to H&H that there is NO intention to remove H&H from our Association.

Or perhaps a better solution was to let's work together and find a solution so both sports can work together which would be a better way for our sport to grow. So, from that mindset the biggest leap forward for WA was about to unfold......

Both the State Board and the H&H committee were aware that there were some discontent amongst members, so a meeting was initiated from the H&H to discuss specific issues and this was held 12th August 2019 at the DSR building between President Vern Godfrey, Vice President Ian Grant and Secretary & Insurance Officer Sue Green. Those in attendance representing H&H were Howard Barks, Lex Shipp and Andrew Charleston. This meeting was extremely positive for both parties with open, honest and respectful discussions held around the table. It was

made clear from the start that H&H members play a major part in our Association with the role they do with vermin control within local governments and Department of Parks and Wildlife etc. This activity has been recently been flagged as a possible insurance risk to all our members who participate, notably members who volunteer their services when the State is being paid and some members reimbursed. This has been a contentious issue amongst members over may years. Inquiries made to our insurance company where not definitive of how our volunteer members would be protected however, under the guidance from SCA our volunteer members should be covered. As we all know insurance policies at times are not easy to decipher the

From this auspicious meeting it was agreed that H&H would like to become their own club and run the existing H&H activities under the banner of this new club. The existing H&H activities includes the current MOU with the Department of Parks and Wildlife, Grape Growers Association, Local and Regional Shires etc. Our Members need

to know that this decision does not preclude those members who choose to do their own hunting activities under the insurance policy and conditions of the SCA. They also will be able to join the new H&H club as an Associate member whilst remaining a full member of their existing club.

At all times during this meeting any decisions made by all parties were in the best interests of ALL our WAFGA members regardless if they are involved in the sport as H&H, Sporting Clays or both.

One of the major considerations for H&H to become their own Club was the importance that they were able to maintain the name WAFGA as it has a lot of history attached to the name, especially as this year we are celebrating 50 years of foundation and State organised a special medal to commemorate this occasion. These medals are currently available for sale. The name WAFGA is certainly better suited for H&H activities these days than Sporting Clays.

From this meeting with the Board It was agreed that the State would allow for H&H to form a club and use the name WAFGA, for this to happen the State had to vote on a name change. Once all the required procedures have taken place and legally approved the H&H club would be given the green light to apply to become incorporated and once approve by the Associations Incorporations branch this new club in WA will be known as WAFGA.

We all are fully aware that there is no guarantee that the new proposed H&H club will get the old WAFGA name but it was a risk we all were prepared to take and move forward with our sport so that H&H and Sporting Clays can operate in conjunction with each and not divide our Association. It is a win - win situation for us all and working together we will do what is necessary for this to happen.

So, the next stage was to involve the Club Delegates and vote on a name change. A Special Resolution was held in September and whilst the majority of the Delegates supported the name change the Board decided not to put this motion to a vote because there were some Delegates representing members who were not convinced and needed more time to discuss. Whilst this was a disappointing decision felt by some members, our State President wanted every Club to be on board and unanimous with this decision, so the meeting lapsed, and we moved forward into round 2.

The benefits of having a strong workable constitution is that for the first time our State

Association had the power and could email out to every one of our members of the Association. An open letter explaining the situation was emailed to all members and those with no email a letter was posted to inform them of what has been proposed by the State Board and the Hunting and Habitat committee. I might add here having a great online membership database made it easy to communicate with all members.

So, some 7 weeks later the same time as the SCA AGM was held in November we went through the Special Resolution to vote again and this time the vote was 100% unanimous by all clubs and WA will now be known as SPORTING CLAYS WESTERN AUSTRALIA INC. and if all goes to plan with the Incorporations Associations branch the new club will have the old WAFGA name registered and a certificate of Incorporation issue as the 8th club registered under the banner of Sporting Clays Western Australia Inc. and we hope all this can be finalised and H&H come on board hopefully by the end of the 2019 year.

We are currently searching for a new logo and without any doubt 2019 here in west will go down in the history books as being a significant year of positive change and growth, with a new name, new H&H club and a modern constitution. It has been a great team effort of people all working in together for the betterment of the sport and hopefully in 2020 we continue to kick goals with the same positive attitudes. How ironic for WA to have a name change and a new constitution to happen in the 50th year anniversary and a new H&H club to be the custodian of the past history and hopefully maintain the old name of WAFGA.

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
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
